BOYS DEPART 'MID CHEERS AND TEARS

Tremendous Crowd Throgs City to Take Leave of Recruits.

Saturday Willmar saw the largest crowd that has ever assembled on the downtown streets and at the station, on the occasion of the leaving of the first quota of Kandiyohi county boys selected for army service. The number of people present have been variously estimated at from eight to ten thousand. Every part of the county was represented, and many outside points. The special train carrying the 40 Kandiyohi county boys, 23 from Stevens county, 48 from Yellow Medicine, 65 from Swift and a contingent from Grant county pulled out of the Willmar yards at three o'clock amid the blowing of all the steam whistles of the city. The Meeker county contingent was given time until the next quota leaves in October.


