OBITUARY

MRS. ANNA C. LINGREN.
Shortly after the hour of midnight last Friday morning, Nov. 23, 1917, Mrs. Anna Lingren passed from the scenes of this life at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mrs. and Mr. Eben E. Lawson of this city, having attained the age of sixty-eight years and 22 days.

About six weeks previous while on a visit at New London she had suffered a stroke of paralysis from which she never recovered and from which she suffered greatly until relieved by death.

Anna Kathrina Lingren was born in Gårdsby parish, Kronobergs län, Småland, Sweden, on the 21st day of October, 1849. Her parents were Daniel and Marie Swenson with whom she came to America when a girl of eight. They settled at Chisago Lake, Minn. As a young girl she was compelled by the family's poverty early to leave home and work for others, being employed at Stillwater for many years. Year 1871 she was married to Carl M. Lingren. After five years they left Chisago Lake and took homestead near Murdock, Swift county. Later they became residents of the village and some time after removed to Minneapolis. In 1897 they moved to New London where the deceased has been a resident since that time with the exception of longer or shorter sojourns at Frank Lake, Minn., El Campo, Texas, and Pagadena, Calif. For the last year or two she has made her home with her daughter at Willmar.

Mrs. Lingren became a widow Sept. 18, 1894. One son, Henry Albert, and a daughter, Josephine, have gone before. She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Eben E. Lawson of Willmar, and a foster son, Clarence N. Lingren. Mrs. Lingren was a woman of sterling character, and strong Christian faith. Her life had been full of trials from childhood. She felt deeply and her love was deep and self-sacrificing. She longed to meet her loved ones gone before.

The funeral took place last Sunday afternoon. Short services were held at the house, 410 First St., at 1:15 o'clock and were conducted by Rev. Jesper Holmquist of the Bethel church. Two beautiful songs were sung by a quartette consisting of Nels Swenson, Sam'l. Nelson, V. E. Fridlund and Bert Swanson. Funeral services were held at the Lebanon Swedish Lutheran church at New London at 3 o'clock and were conducted by Rev. A. F. Almer assisted by Rev. Holmquist, the latter speaking briefly in English. The church choir rendered two songs on the occasion and Bert Swanson of Willmar sang two solos.

The pall bearers at Willmar were Jos. O. Estrem, C. A. Lindberg, O. A. Grangaard, O. A. Hildahl, Solon L. Benton and A. H. Brown. At the New London church the pall bearers were S. C. Hillman, Lewis Eckman, Peter Broberg, Gustaf Green, J. M. Monson and J. G. Peterson. The remains were laid at rest in the Lebanon cemetery.

Those from a distance who attended the funeral were Miss Amanda Lindgren of Lindstrom, Minn., Mrs. Elizabeth Almen of Balaton, Mr. and Mrs. Peter O. Hall and Mr. and Mrs. Lundquist and children of Atwater and Mrs. Christine Larson of Murdock.

He was shot by his brother-in-law Martini J. Seem, who fired three shots at him. After shooting Mr. Halvorson, Mr. Seem committed suicide by shooting himself.

The late Mr. Halvorson was fifty-one years of age and is mourned by his wife and other relatives. No cause is known for the deed.

After the ceremony, a reception will be given at the bride's home.


Mr. and Mrs. McDermott will be at home to their friends after December 15 at Kandiyohi, Minn.
