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FORMER WILLMAR BOY KILLED ON FIRING LINE

Stewart Parsons Former High School Student and Resident of First Ward Meets Death in Trenches.

The horrors of this dreadful war were brought close to home when the sad word came of the death of Stewart Parsons, second son of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. Parsons formerly of Harrison, and for a number of years, residents of Willmar, but now of Orben-dale, Alberta, Can., killed in action "somewhere in France," Nov. 13.

He was a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Henderson of this village and cousin of the Editor.

Stewart enlisted and left for France from Winnipeg, Can., a year ago last August and had been with the machine gun section within the firing line for the past eleven months and up until the time of his death, with the exception of being gassed once, had not suffered a scratch.

We do not realize the seriousness of this war until word comes of someone we have known, who has given up his life for his country. Our soldiers are just entering the trenches and already the message has come over the waters, "killed in action," and as we read the list of dead, it is with fear that some of our dear ones may be numbered with the fallen.—Green Lake Breeze.

The Willmar High School will open its debating season, as a member of the State Debating League, on Friday evening of this week at the high school auditorium at 7:45 p.m. This debate will be between the Willmar High School and the high school at Litchfield. The question for debate is "Resolved, That the various states should establish schedules of minimum wage for unskilled labor, constitutionality granted."

Willmar has a team composed wholly of boys as follows:

Harold Gilbert, William Loney and Russell Frost. These boys will speak in both the main address and the rebuttal, in the order given. The Willmar team is made up of wide awake boys who have entered into the spirit of preparation in earnest and promise to give a good account of themselves on the floor.

Litchfield will be represented by two boys and a girl. One of their team is a member of the senior class and the other two are members of the junior class.

Willmar will support the affirmative side of the question, and Litchfield will contend for the negative.

Litchfield has a new superintendent and a new high school principal this year and they are entering into public discussion work with great interest. They have been holding series of declamatory contests for some time and have already debated this same question with Cokato at which time they had two teams, one upholding each side of the question. 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KARL J. NYSTROM.

Karl J. Nystrom, a former resident of Willmar, was killed in an accident at Minneapolis last Sunday morning, when he accidentally fell thru a manhole. He was nearly sixty years of age, and a native of Sweden. He moved to Minneapolis about five years ago, shortly after the death of his wife, who was a sister of Lewis, Andrew and Olof Fridlund of this city and Peter Fridlund of Sauk Centre. Deceased is mourned by two sons, Elmer and Harry Nystrom of Minneapolis, and by a brother at Topeka, Kansas.

The funeral was held today. Services were held at two o'clock at the Presbyterian church, Rev. W. B. Jones officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Nystrom were here from Minneapolis, and Chas. W. Lonn, Lewis Johnson, F. A. Holmberg and G. W. Johnson. The interment took place at Fairview, where the wife and a daughter who have gone before sleep the long sleep.

VERDICT OF \$9,350.

Martin A. Enger of this city received a verdict of \$9,350 in a case at Marshall against the Great Northern Railway Company, last Friday. Mr. Enger was injured on December 20, 1915 when he fell into the engine pit at the local round house. The round house was filled with steam at the time making it impossible to see the pit and hence the accident occurred.

Dr. I. S. Benson of this city and Dr. Curran of Granite Falls were the leading witnesses for Mr. Enger. An X-ray picture taken by Dr. Benson showed that the injured man had a fractured rib near the spinal cord producing a pressure on the spine and causing disability.

Atty. Tom Davis of Marshall was Mr. Enger's attorney.

OVER EMBANKMENT.

Mr. Murphy of Springfield, who was driving a Dixie Flyer car, had a narrow escape from serious injury last Sunday afternoon shortly after two o'clock when enroute to this city. "RED CROSS CHRISTMAS" IS BEING PLANNED

A Drive Will Be Made For 3,500 More Members Before Christmas.

A nationwide movement has started to make the coming Christmas a Red Cross Christmas. The spirit of the Red Cross work is so closely related to the spirit of Christmas that no doubt this movement will strike a popular chord and be generally observed. It is aimed to give expression to this spirit by the securing of members for the Red Cross. A nationwide drive will be made to secure a total membership of 15,000,000. The quota for this country is about 4,000. We have now about 500, so this will mean securing 3,500 members in this country before Christmas.

For each member in a house a special Red Cross banner is to be furnished which is to be displayed in a window on Christmas eve, with a candle placed behind it. This banner will be a red cross on a white field with a blue border. In this way the houses of city and country will be beautifully illuminated on Christmas night.

This will be similar to a beautiful Swedish custom of illuminating the windows of the house with candles, both on Christmas eve, and on early Christmas morning as the people were going to early morning services.

A committee of about fifteen business men have been appointed to have charge of this campaign, those from Willmar being S. E. Stansberry, R. W. Stanford, D. N. Tallman, Atty. Charles Johnson and C. B. Caneson. One person from each branch of the Kandiyohi County Chapter will be added to this committee. Further details about this big Red Cross Christmas movement will be given in our next issue.
