OBITUARY

EDLA RYBERG.

Funeral services for Edla Gunborg Ryberg were held Thursday afternoon, November 22. A brief devotional service was held at the house at 1:30 o'clock and at the church at 2 o'clock.

The pastor chose his text for the Swedish sermon from the Epistle of Jude, the 21st verse, which reads, "Keep yourselves in the love of God, looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life." And the text for the English sermon was Luke 1:48, "He hath regarded the low estate of his handmaiden; for behold, from henceforth generations shall call me blessed." Songs were sung by a quartet consisting of Misses Amanda Abrahamson and Anna Lundeen, Mr. Austin Laurence and City Attorney Walter R. Nelson. Miss Agnes Laurence presided at the organ. The congregation sang the Swedish chorale No. 494.

Edla Gunborg Ryberg was born in Karlshamn, Blekinge, Sweden, September 9, 1892; baptized September 23, 1892. In 1901 she came with her mother, brothers and sister to Paxton. Her father had come here a year earlier. On April 12, 1908, she was confirmed in our church. She entered high school, but the family moving to Willmar, she completed her high school education there and afterwards studied at the Minnesota State Normal. She taught school in Minnesota four years, until her health failed last spring, when she returned to her home in Paxton, her parents having removed here the year before. She passed away quietly Monday, Nov. 19, at the age of 25 years, 9 months and 10 days.

Those who know her best tell of her beautiful character and unobtrusive piety. Her parents, brothers and sister comfort themselves with the memory of her Christian humility and faith. May God guide their lives so that there may be a happy reunion in heaven.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bernt Ryberg, and six brothers and one sister mourn her: Ernest Ryberg, of Paxton; Mrs. Victor Sullivan, of Paxton; Arvid Ryberg, of Denver, Colo.; Primus Ryberg, in U. S. Army; Otto Ryberg, of Paxton; Eric, in U. S. Navy, and Paul Ryberg, of Paxton. All these were present except Primus and Eric, who could not obtain furloughs to attend the funeral. Besides, she leaves a number of other relatives and many friends.—Oliveblad, Paxton, Ill.
