BUY RED CROSS SEALS



Every man, woman and child in Minnesota has an opportunity now to work for a war measure upon which depends the health of our nation.

In the Red Cross Seals we have ammunition which will win the fight against an invasion by tuberculosis. These seals are now for sale in every community; several should be attached to every piece of mail, express packages and check sent from now until the first of the year.

Every seal on a package or a letter is an evidence of the sender's patriotism. It is a patriotism which applies at home, for it means driving out an enemy which is killing thousands yearly. It is up to this country to make a record seal sale this year.

Minnesota has increased its allotment by six million, and unless every one among us joins in the campaign, the fund for fighting tuberculosis will fall short of its need.

The campaign for Red Cross Christmas seals always brings home to us unpleasant but graphic facts about our national need for more health work. Tuberculosis kills at least 15,000 persons each year in the United States, or one every three minutes. It kills one-third of all who die between the ages of 18 and 45, and it costs us more than \$500,000,000 a year in loss of life and labor.

Red Cross nurses, on a sweep of the State, are bringing the truth of the war tuberculosis problem home to the people of Minnesota.

These nurses endeavor to acquaint communities with the advantages to be gained by having a permanent nurse. Usually work is centered about the school because the school is a vantage point in anti-tuberculosis work.

The Health Association sends these demonstration nurses out as the result of the Red Cross Seal Sale; also, where funds are provided locally. At present more requests for nurses are on file than can be filled because many Health Nurses have been called for Red Cross work abroad.

Registrants are bound by law to keep themselves advised of all proceedings in respect of them and failure to do so may result in their losing right to claim exemption or discharge. Please request newspapers to give this warning broad and CONTINUOUS PUBLICATION from this time until the process of mailing questionnaires has been accomplished.
