A freight wreck on this branch of the Great Northern seven miles the other side of Mora, interferred with traffic over this line Monday. The freight train was proceeding towards Sandstone when it ran on to a broken rail, and three of the cars and the caboose on the rear of the train went into the ditch. The broken rail went in between the section crew but the signal was overlooked by the engineer. The cars were badly smashed up and the crew inside of the caboose had a narrow escape. They succeeded in getting out of the caboose by crawling out of the windows, but all of them were badly bruised and shaken up. One of them had his shoulder broken.
