LAST MEN OF FIRST DRAFT TO LEAVE SOON

Sixty-Two Will Leave From This County Feb. 23 Or Soon Thereafter.

Sixty-two men will be called to leave Kandiyohi county for Camp Dodge on one of the five days beginning Feb. 23, the exact time not being known at this time. This will be the final contingent of the first draft.

The local board speeded up physical examinations somewhat calling twenty-five additional men to be examined Saturday, thirty on Tuesday, next and thirty on Wednesday. Following these examinations there is likely to be a delay before further examinations are ordered.

Four of the men on these lists, Johannes Teigland, Harry Anderson, Arthur Hed and George Brogren were examined today and passed, and will now begin a course in aviation building here.

Passenger Train No. 161 on the Sioux City Division, which left here early last Thursday morning, was wrecked near Dalton, Iowa, in the forenoon of that day. The cause of the wreck was a rail spread. After the engine had passed over without trouble, the baggage car, sleepers, two passenger coaches and a private car disconnected from the engine and went off the track, leaving out to the one side. 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OBITUARY

MRS. C. A. GREEN. Mrs. Gustava Green, one of the old settlers and highly respected residents of our county passed away in death at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Broman in the city of Fahlun last Sunday, Feb. 5, 1918 at the age of 70 years, 4 months and 7 days.

Mrs. Gustava (Anderson) Green was born in Vastergotland, Sweden, on Oct. 27, 1847. She came to America with her husband, Charles A. Green, in 1882, in the company of the ship "The Union" which was wrecked with ten children, seven of whom are left to mourn her beloved wife. Mrs. Green was a member of the Swedish Methodist congregation in Willmar and Frank Wesley, Editor, William and Henry Green who live at different points on the West coast. She deceased is also mourned by three sisters three brothers, thirteen grandchildren and many other relatives. Mrs. Green was an early resident of Burbank, her husband taking a claim in section 31 in 1885. Some time after her husband's death she moved to Willmar where she has resided until a year or two ago when, owing to her failing health, she went to stay with her daughter, Mrs. Broman, near the home of long duration culminated into heart failure and she died suddenly.

The funeral was a member of the Swedish Methodist congregation in Willmar and had always been one of its most respected and beloved characters. The funeral will be held tomorrow (Thursday) at 2 o'clock p.m. at the Oak Park M. E. church, Rev. G. O. Westman officiating. The burial will be in the Oak Park cemetery. The pall bearers will be John Kieberg, Peter Nelson, Magnus Peterson, Henry Broman, John Wicklund and Peter Wicklund.

OLE OLSON. Ole Olson, well-known railroad blacksmith, passed away last Friday at his home in this city after a two years' illness, at the age of 62 years, 4 months, and 4 days.

The deceased was born at Pilksa, Flekkefjord, Norway, Sept. 27, 1852. He came to this country in 1882. In 1891 he was married to Mrs. M. Olson. They lived at Minneapolis until in 1896, since which year they have resided at Willmar. He leaves to mourn his untimely death his wife and three children—Mabel, Sigvald and John. 
