DAYLIGHT SAVING BEGINS SUNDAY

Move Your Clock Ahead One Hour Late Next Saturday Night

The "Daylight Saving" law goes into effect next Sunday. At two o'clock Sunday morning, March 31, the law provides that all clocks be moved forward one hour. All railroads are compelled to use the new time when it goes into effect, so that trains already on their way before the time is changed will be regarded an hour late for the balance of the run. It is figured that this order will save millions of tons of coal throughout the country as one more hour of daylight will be used and the hour less of artificial light will be necessary. The law provides for moving back the clock one hour on the first Sunday in October. Better turn your clock or watch ahead one hour before going to bed next Saturday night.
