SURGICAL DRESSINGS DEPARTMENT ACTIVE

Willmar Red Cross Makes Front Line Packets for the U. S. Army. April Allotment 400.

The Willmar Red Cross Surgical Department is making hundreds of front line packets. Seventeen pieces compose a packet. The pad which has a neatly pleated bandage attached to it by means of a swivel thread forms the foundation of the packet. A half dozen compresses compose the second layer, on either side is placed a gauze packing and six snowball like tampons. This is wrapped in sterilization paper in an apothecary's package. The paper package is slipped into a muslin envelope, with an application tucked in under its flap, and tied with a thread which can be easily snapped by the surgeon. Through the Northern division of the Red Cross, they go East to be sterilized and sealed, and then to the front for immediate use. The Willmar's allotment of packets for April is 400, which means 8000 pieces. The Department also shipped 7055 other dressings this month.


Loyalty Rally
