FOR STATE SENATOR

To the People of the Twenty-Fifth Legislative District.

A short time ago I made a public announcement and stated therein some reasons why I intended not to file for re-election for Senator, but the requests that I enter the race have become so numerous and insistent, coming from people in the various walks of life, that I feel it a public duty to reconsider the position I then took and to therefore hereby formally announce myself as a candidate for the said office of Senator. In pursuance thereof, I present the following statement:

Our district is largely an agricultural one. We must recognize agriculture as the cornerstone and foundation of all industrial life. Its prosperity means general prosperity among our people. My attitude toward the farming industry has ever been that anything or any legislation contributing to the welfare and prosperity of that industry, proportionately benefits all other ordinary lines of business pursuits. During my ten years of service in the Legislature, it has always been my aim and ambition to support any fair and just legislation demanded by the farmers. I was raised on the farm. I came from the farm when I entered my present occupation. In that occupation, in view of my location, my exclusive dealings have been with farmers. As far as I know, we have gotten along pretty well. In the session of 1905 I voted for and supported the Constitutional Amendment providing for State Hall Insurance, which Amendment, however, failed of ratification in the election the following year. I supported in the last year's session the so-called Tonnage Tax Bill providing for the taxation of iron ore. I am heartily in favor of legislation demanded

by the farmers for the betterment of marketing conditions of their products. I recognize the fairness of the principle that all the people of a district, regardless of their position or classification in life, be they farmers, business people, laborers, professional people, are entitled to a fair and honest representation. Therefore, serving in a representative capacity for the people, I will never place myself in a position to serve any one special class or interest. Any so-called "Big Business" seeking special privileges, unreasonable and excessive proffering or exploitation of power never had favor and never will have a place with me. We are a democracy, by the people and for the people and according to our Constitution we all have equal rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Any condition that may exist socially, economically or politically, contrary to this idea, violates the principles upon which our forefathers founded this, our grand and splendid system of government. When before you as a candidate in the past, I made you the plain promise that I would serve you and your interests to the best of my ability and that is the best promise I can present to you as a candidate again. In view of the position as Chairman of the Committee of Temperance in the session of 1915, it was my fortune to have a good deal to do in the work of engineering thru for passage the County Option Bill. Acting in the same capacity during the last legislative session, I introduced and led in the Senate the contest for the passage of the State-Wide Prohibition Amendment to be voted upon in the coming election.

The farmers of this district are working to their utmost to produce food for the nation and our allies. There is at this time no greater waste than turning food stuffs into beer and alcohol. In conclusion I desire to state that I shall be glad to receive the support of everyone, particularly those who stand for fairness and justice and those who want to see the affairs of our government, municipal, county, state and national, run in a business, sane and economical manner, which I maintain is extremely important at this time. I ask and shall need the support of all who believe in the upholding of our government and the support of our great President in his efforts to successfully and honorably terminate this war and of all who believe in the loyal support of all authoritative agencies, local and state, that are co-operating with the national government in this critical period of our nation. If elected, I shall stand for good business, good citizenship, intelligent service. I shall take my orders only from the people of Swift and Kandiyohi Counties, whose confidence I have not betrayed and whose mandates I have not disobeyed. This is my platform, which I respectfully submit for your consideration.
