## STATE SUPT'S HAVE CONFERENCE HERE

Supt. and Mrs. Geo. H. Freeman  
Hosts to Colleagues and Many  
Invited Guests.

The quarterly conference of the executive officers of the Minnesota State Institutions was held at the Willmar State Asylum yesterday, with about twenty-four such officials and a number of invited guests present.

The out-of-town visitors came via the twin cities in a special sleeper, which was set off at Willmar. They were entertained at breakfast by Dr. and Mrs. Geo. H. Freeman in their apartments in the Administration building at 8:30. The visitors inspected the buildings and grounds and visited until 10:30 o'clock, when the conference opened. The speakers and the topics discussed at the morning session and at the afternoon session, which began at two o'clock, were the following:

"Sanitary. Should it be considered as a separate subject by the state? What should be the limit of state care of all classes of unfortunate people?" H. M. Phelps, M. D., Superintendent, St. Peter Hospital.

"The Epileptics. What should be the attitude of the state and community toward them?" Miss Merrill, Field Worker School for Feeble Minded.

"Drug Interests." Geo. H. Freeman, M. D., Superintendent, Willmar State Asylum.

"The Federal Narcotic Laws and their Enforcement." C. E. Boudin, Internal Revenue Agent, St. Paul.

"Army Hospitals, Red Cross and other War Work." Miss Carey, Librarian of the State Board of Control.

## PLANNING RED CROSS PARADE

An Outline of What is Being Done for The Great Demonstration.

Arrangements are now well under way for Kandiyohi County's big patriotic parade which is to be held at the County seat on Saturday afternoon, May 18th. The committee in charge of the affair report that they are meeting with splendid response on the part of everyone all over the county and the indications are that the doings will be something unusual.

All the Red Cross branches and auxiliaries of the county are expected to take part in the parade. The Bands of the county are expected to play. Patriotic floats are planned and many interesting features will no doubt be pulled off.

Every Civil War veteran in the county who possibly can, is asked to take part in parade. (Those too feeble to march will ride). A call has been sent out to the Spanish American War Veterans of the county and is receiving a hearty response. They will all be in line. The high schools and grade schools of the county are expected to take part either as marchers with floats or in some other patriotic manner.

The railroad men of the Willmar division of the Great Northern will take part in the parade, which promises to be a big feature.

The speakers of the day will be Sargeant Major Paul, a New Zealand, lately of the Canadian service, who has just arrived from the battle fields of France having put in three years and three months of fighting and having been wounded twice. He will tell of the conditions "over there" and of the importance of the Red Cross work, what it means to the soldier, as well as tell of things of a vital interest at this time.

Atwater will be on deck, and if there is any chance of getting a substitute player or two to fill vacancies from the boys gone to the front, will have their hand along. The "London band is entirely "shot to pieces" by war enlistments but the village will be represented with something anyway and we all know what New London County's young men entrained to join the U. S. Army training for the big fight. These fifteen men were sent to Columbus Barracks, Ohio.

At 11:30 a fine banquet was given the soldier boys at the Delmonico Cafe by the Willmar Commercial Club. Judge Gilbert, president of the Club, presided at the table. He first made a short address himself in which he expressed the belief that the young men would so conduct themselves as to be an honor to their country and their home county. He told them that they could rest assured that Kandiyohi County would stand back of them and that when the war was won and they came back again covered with glory, there would be such a great and joyous celebration in Willmar that the old town has never known its like before. He called on Attorney Chas. Johnson who paid a tribute to the boys and wished them Godspeed. He spoke eloquently of the cause for which the United States and her Allies are fighting. The third speaker was Rev. J. N. Anderson, whose remarks as usual were well placed and fitting. He spoke of how the war is bringing the people back to the study of religion and its importance to the maintenance of civilization. He referred to how the boys in the army are turning to religion.

At the train which left at 2:30 o'clock, a large crowd of people, relatives and friends, were present to say good-bye to the boys.

## ENDORSEMENT OF GOV. BURNQUIST

Conference at Court House Saturday Endorsed Nelson, Burnquist, Gandrud and Frye.

A political conference was held at the Courthouse last Saturday afternoon. It had not been publicly announced, but the word had been passed out to certain individuals through the county. As near as the Tribune has been able to learn there were about sixty-five people present.

S. B. Quale was chairman and E. L. Thorpe of Penock was secretary. Speeches were made by Dr. Christian Johnson, E. W. Stanford, L. E. Covell, C. R. C. Baker, Hans A. Peterson, Judge T. O. Gilbert and C. W. Odell. Dr. Christian Johnson introduced the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted by those present:

"With our Nation engaged in the greatest war of all history against the most ruthless, savage and unprieced exposure of brute force and frightfulness that the world has ever seen, and in the name of the principles of democracy, justice, humanity and the deathless principles that gave our Country birth, we pledge our undivided and loyal support to the President of these United States, the National Congress, the Army and the Navy, and all branches of the government, until the war shall have been brought to a victorious conclusion.

"We believe that those officials who have been entirely loyal since our Country entered this war, and who are candidates for re-election, should be returned to office without opposition, and those seeking office who have uttered disloyal sentiments and who have entered the conflict, or who may have announced an eleventh hour loyalty since becoming candidates for election to some office within the gift of the people, should receive the rebuke they deserve by the refusal of all loyal citizens to support them. A premium should not be placed upon disloyalty.

"We pledge our votes and support in the coming election to those candidates only who have always been and now are of undoubted loyalty to the Nation in prosecution of this war. In this crisis the motto of all patriots should be, "Place none but Americans on our ballot."

"We especially commend and urge for re-election to the Senate the good and true Grand Old Man of Minnesota, Hon. Knute Nelson, who also has always been and now is a naturalized American citizen, has been second to none in patriotism, love of country and devotion to the principles for which America stands, who has unwaveringly in his loyalty and splendid Americanism since our entrance into the war, and who never once has allowed himself to be led astray by the false doctrines of those, who consciously or unconsciously, are assisting in spreading the propaganda of America's enemies, who are endeavoring to create strife, unrest, hatred and dissension, and thus divide and weaken our own people whose entire energies should be devoted to the support of the
