Patriotic Addresses are Made. J. F. Branton Elected Head of Association.

The annual meeting of the Kandiyohi County Old Settlers Association was held at Spicer yesterday and a very enjoyable time was had by all present.

J. O. Malmberg of Atwater, president of the Association, presided over the meetings. The business session was held in the forenoon. The reports of the secretary and of the treasurer were read and accepted. The Association unanimously decided to place the \$736 which it has in its Memorial fund at this time in United States War Savings Stamps and voted to invest \$334 in baby bonds which when due will amount to \$1,000.

At noon the visitors enjoyed a picnic dinner at which the Spicer Commercial club served free coffee. The afternoon program opened with the invocation by Rev. T. M. Findley and the singing of America by the audience.

124 BOYS LEAVE MID-SUMMER DAY

Largest Contingent Yet Furnished to Depart Next Monday.

Next Monday, June 24th, will see the departure of the largest contingent of selective service men yet to leave our county for military service in Uncle Sam's army. Not less than one hundred twenty-four recruits are included in this call. There will be recruits from Wilkin, Stevens, Swift, Yellow Medicine, Kandiyohi and Meeker counties, the total of which will be 424, leaving at one time.

The boys from up the line and from Granite Falls will arrive on the regular train and a special will be made up here at Willmar which is scheduled to leave at 2:15 p. m. The men will be taken to Camp Grant, Rockford, Ill.

Plans for the program for the day have not yet been completed, but it is expected that the Raymond Band, two members of which organization are among the boys leaving, will be here to furnish music, and that the exercises will be held at the Court House.

ANNUAL PICNIC OF HOLSTEIN BREEDERS

Big Time was Had at Bergquist Farm Friday Afternoon.

The County Holstein Breeders' Association held a very good meeting in the form of their annual picnic last Friday afternoon at Mr. C. O. Bergquist's place five miles east of Willmar. Mr. Bergquist had hauled home a load of big smooth planks and a comfortable place was provided for everybody.

Mr. H. H. Searles of University Farm, St. Paul, who is secretary of the State Holstein Association, spoke on the advantages of having a county, a state, and a national breeders' association comprised of men who are interested in and who are breeding and managing one particular breed.

Mr. J. C. Cort, of Des Moines, Ia., who is working for the National Holstein Breeders' Association, gave a splendid address taking up the need of co-operation and the value of a cow testing association. From Mr. Cort's talk which was based upon a wide range of experience, it would seem very profitable for the dairymen of the county to form a cow testing association. Experience shows that in the ordinary dairy herd two cows out of five are fed and cared for at a loss. Often, if a man would kill off his poor cows and keep only the good ones he would make more profit. The only way to tell the good ones is by testing.

Miss Mary L. Bull, of the University Farm, St. Paul, gave one of the best talks and demonstrations we have held in this county. Miss Bull's talk was very interesting and instructive, being filled with ordinary human events and practical applications. The central thought of the demonstration was to show and explain the variety of good dishes that can be made on the farm from skim milk in the form of cottage cheese.

The president then called upon the Secretary, Mr. Rodegeb, for a few remarks, who told those present that Miss Bull had not mentioned all the dairy dishes. That there was a whole freezer full of ice cream waiting.

Everybody enjoyed the bountiful spread of several cottage cheese dishes, cottage cheese sandwiches, cake, cookies, doughnuts, coffee, and ice cream. The event was declared a success and the members present are looking forward to the annual event next year.

SIXTEEN BOYS ENTER SPECIAL TRAINING

BURNQUIST IS RENOMINATED

Latest Returns So Indicate. Democratic Nomination is in Doubt.

The latest returns indicate that Governor Burnquist was re-nominated to be the Republican standard bearer this fall, 2,498 precincts out of 3,119 in the State give Burnquist 180,156 and Lindbergh, 131,493. This is a lead that cannot be overcome. Three nominations on the State ticket are in doubt. 1595 precincts give Frankson 79,334; Crane 71,040; and Stephens, 40,737 for lieutenant governor. With more than half the state to hear from and Frankson and Stephens to divide the vote, Crane may get the nomination.

The same situation in the clerk of Supreme Court nomination gives Mueller, the League candidate, 63,785 to 68,041 for Caswell and 52,061 for Magnuson. Less than half the precincts of the state give Hilton 96,890 and Sullivan 85,292 for Attorney General. Schmahl, Preus and Rines appear to be renominated.

BERGQUIST AND NELSON ARE ON TICKET

Six Cornered Contest For Treasurer Leaves C. F. Olson a Close Third.

In the scrap for the county treasurer nominations the six contestants received votes as follows: Victor Bergquist 1142 N. O. Nelson 1028 C. F. Olson 1024 Levi V. Lund 476 W. F. Gratz 288 H. H. Flygare 137 The close finish for second place was a feature of the contest. The last precinct heard from, Norway Lake, placed N. Nelson four votes ahead of C. F. Olson, who had been leading for second place before. There is some talk of a recount.

SHERIFF BONDE GETS A ROUSING VOTE

Efforts to discredit Faithful Servant Rebuked by the People. Sheriff Peter Bonde is a happy man today with an endorsement from the people that is a record breaker. He received 2,738 votes in the primary, out of a total of 4,246, the largest number cast for any office including that for governor. He lost the city to his nearest opponent Chief Gilbertson by 200 votes, but the county districts came in almost solidly for him. Gilbertson's total vote was 1024 and J. P. Dale's 474.

FARMER PARADE WAS A LONG ONE

Over Seven Hundred Cars Participated in the Thru-County Demonstration.

The Non-Partisan League parade through the county last Friday was something unprecedented in the political history of the county. The impression made upon the spectators as mile after mile of automobiles passed loaded with quiet but determined country people, and decorated with flags and banners, cannot be described. It was soul gripping. To such people as have been led to believe that the farmers' movement is based on disloyalty, the sight was of course exasperating, and led them to say and do many things they otherwise would not have thought of saying or doing. But even on such a presence, in the parade of the leading and best known successful farmers of the county had cooling effect, for it began to dawn upon them that after all they might not have understood the matter correctly.

IMPLEMENTS TO BE MANUFACTURED

P. H. Sackett Syndicate Buys Old Standard Factory at Willmar.

P. H. Sackett of Minneapolis has purchased the old Standard Tractor plant from A. P. Bergerson and will move his manufacturing plant to Willmar. He has looked up the advantages offered by Willmar as a shipping point and for furnishing labor, and he has found them very satisfactory. The Matt Light Draft spreaders are made by this concern and will be one of the implements to be manufactured here. Mr. Sackett will receive a cordial welcome from Willmar people in his efforts to establish his factory here.
