ANOTHER LARGE QUOTA IS CALLED

Three Men Entrain Saturday for Camp Dodge. Quotas of 85 and 5 Men to Leave Soon.

According to call No. 1166 received by the local board, three men of the limited service class will leave next Saturday for Camp Dodge, Iowa. These men will be selected from the following four: Ernest C. Thompson, Oscar J. Salvorson and William B. Rykken. Still another quota of limited service men will leave during the four days ending Sept. 6th entraining for Camp Grant, Ill. A list of seven has been issued, of which the five will be selected. These are: Pasagroten Christoforoussis, Carl E. Fronsens, Carl M. Bjorkman, Roy Baker, Jesse Thomson, John P. Anderson and George H. Olson. One of the largest calls received demands a general quota of eighty-five men to leave about Sept. 6th for Camp Grant, Rockford, Ill. We have been unable to secure this list for this week's issue but will publish it next week.

FORMER MASTER MECHANIC HERE HAS PASSED AWAY

G. A. Bruce, General Master Mechanic Dies After Operation at Minot, N. D.

The people of our city were shocked to learn Monday of the sad death of G. A. Bruce, General Master Mechanic on the G. N. Railroad. Mr. Bruce was a familiar figure in the city some fifteen years ago when he occupied the position of Master Mechanic on the Willmar Division. He passed away at 9:30 a. m. on Monday, Mr. Bruce, accompanied by his wife who was by his side until the last, was on his customary inspection tour of the Northwest Division, but was suddenly taken ill and compelled to undergo a serious operation for acute appendicitis at the Minot Hospital. His weakened constitution was unable to bear the severity of the operation and after a comparatively short time passed away. Mr. Bruce was a man of sterling qualities, embodied with progressive and high ideals, which placed him into the influential and responsible position which he occupied until his death. The flag of the local division was at half mast Monday and Tuesday out of respect to the deceased.

Iron Beam Pierces Forehead.

Anton Sundberg suffered a painful and wicked gash in the forehead, Monday morning while riding on his bicycle. The iron beam of the front wheel cut to notice the sharp end of an iron beam extended from a pile driver and before he became aware of his danger, the beam hit him, cutting a cruel gash in his forehead and penetrating him for several minutes. In falling, a long sharp splinter cut its way thru his coat sleeve and severely bruised his right arm from the wrist to the elbow. Blood flowed freely from the hole in the forehead but Mr. Sundberg managed to find his way to the roundhouse where his injuries were treated.

Buried in Potter's Field.

The unfortunate man had sojourned at Willmar a few days before going to Pennock and had been spoken to by several people here, but had given no clue to his identity.

Mrs. Maria Swenson LÖF was born in Malung Parish, Dalarna, Sweden on the 11th day of April 1822. She was married year 1848 to Jonas Swenson LÖF and came with her husband and children to America twenty years later, locating on a homestead on section 24, Town of Mamre in Kandiyohi county.

REPEATEDLY BAYONETTED AFTER FALLING IN BATTLE

Lieut. Lyksett Survives After Having Been Left for Dead and Stripped by Huns.

Ed. C. Lyksett, with the P. H. Sackett Syndicate of our city, today received particulars of the severe wounds received by his brother, Lieut. A. J. Lyksett, of Hudson, Wis., when he went over the top in France with his command Aug. 1. At the time he was reported from Washington, D. C., as severely wounded. A letter received states that he was first bayoneted and after falling he was repeatedly bayoneted by the enemy, and that he was stripped of his clothes. He was brought in before late on the following day, Aug. 2. In spite of his terrible injuries he is still surviving and may recover. He is at Base Hospital No. 43.
