## ELLINGSON NOW A Y. M. C. A. WAR WORK SECRETARY

Former Willmar Boy Goes to France to Help in Work of the Red Triangle.

The Spokesman-Review of Spokane, Wash., Aug. 19, contained the following item regarding a former Willmar boy:

"C. H. Ellingson, cashier for Arthur D. Jones & Co., was selected yesterday as secretary of the state board of control. His appointment becomes effective August 21.  
"Mr. Ellingson has been associated with the Arthur D. Jones company for the last eight years, coming here from Minnesota, where he was an employee of the auditor's office of the Northern Pacific.  
"Mr. Ellingson is an accountant and student of law. Two years ago he passed the state bar examination at Olympia. He is a prominent figure in local democratic circles. Previous to this appointment he had made application for service in the Y. M. C. A. in France, but as yet had received no orders from the government. His home address is E427 Twenty-third avenue."  
Later the following item appeared:  
"George W. Belt Jr., was appointed secretary of the state board of control yesterday. Clarence C. Ellingson, who was previously named for the position, subsequently declined, to enter Y. M. C. A. service with the army in France. Belt will take office on September 1. He is a son of Judge Belt, is an attorney and was secretary of the Spokane democratic county central committee for years.  
"Mr. Ellingson, cashier of the Arthur D. Jones company, received his appointment to the state board from Olympia Monday at 4:30 p. m. and at 6 p. m. he received a telegram from San Francisco that he has been appointed a Y. M. C. A. war work secretary."

## MAJOR YOST TAKES A FEW DAYS' REST

Recruiting in Minnesota in Hands of Lieut. Stephen DaCosta. Work is Still Limited.

Raising the maximum age limit for enlistment in the United States Army has not resulted in securing very many recruits. The fact that only men between the ages of 44 to 55 years are now accepted, means a heavy percentage of rejections. In addition only men who are qualified by special training for staff corps are accepted.  
There is no change in the status of the Recruiting Service as yet. No definite word has been received as to what action will be taken. The general belief is that with the passage of the new draft act, enlistments may possibly be allowed in the various military branches for a limited period. Every effort will be made, however, to prevent the disruption of industries. Rush applicants for enlistment has always resulted in some announcement of a change in draft age limits. It was to prevent just such an occurrence that the lid was clamped on recruiting for all branches of the service August 21.  
Pending rearrangement of the Recruiting Service, Major John D. Yost, Recruiting Officer for the Minnesota District, has availed himself of a ten day's leave of absence recently granted. The ten days will be spent in Washington, D. C. in his absence the district will be in command of Lieutenant S. Stephen DaCosta who has been Assistant Recruiting Officer since last December and is well known throughout the state.
