Alton Crosby, pioneer resident, newspaper editor and postmaster of Willmar passed away at St. Barnabas Hospital at Minneapolis last Friday from heart failure following an operation.

Alton Crosby was born at Centerville, Mass., October 25, 1858. He grew up in his native town and at the age of eighteen left to make his future in the west.



Another soldier boy from this community has made the supreme sacrifice in France, when Private Lewis Larson passed away at the Rest Camp Hospital in France, from an attack of pneumonia.

Deceased was born in Lake Andrew Township Sept. 25, 1886. He spent most of his young days in Colfax. He was a member of the United Lutheran church. He is mourned by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Christian Larson, two brothers, Oliver at Camp McArthur, Texas, and Melvin at home, and five sisters—Mrs. Darwin Johnson of Colfax, Laura, Inez, Clara and Pearl at home, and many other relatives and friends.
