RULING CLASSES ARE CHASED OUT

Reports From All Parts of Germany Shows People Have Really Taken Control of Affairs—Plutocrats Everywhere Anxious to Save Autocrats—Terms Exact and Undoubtedly Mean Peace—Wilson Loses Partisan Appeal—Nonpartisan League and Labor Make Big Gains.

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington, D. C.—The great event of the previous week and the greatest event perhaps of the modern world was the signing of the armistice. On November 11 the great war came to an end. Simultaneously came the news that the common people were taking control in Germany and that royalty of all kinds and degrees had abdicated. Many of the ruling class, including the kaiser, had taken the precaution to flee to neutral territory. The common people everywhere gave themselves up to celebrating the great event which should mean the end of militarism, the end of wars, the swift sweep of democracy over the world, the speedy return of the boys at the front unless those who now control affairs in allied nations are false to their duty and trust.

Efforts to Save Autocrats.

There is widespread evidence, however, that plutocrats everywhere feel that they have made a vital blunder in allowing the war to go on until the kaiser's throne was no longer tenable. With the fall of the kaiser all that depended on him and was built around him—the big business of Germany, the junker class, the large banking power—fell also. In fact the kaiser was largely a figurehead registering the collective will of these interests. Germany thus takes a big step toward industrial and political democracy at the same time. This is what the plutocrats everywhere fear and what the big press refers to by various bad names such as bolshevism, red socialism and anarchy.

In the second year of the war international bankers met secretly in Switzerland to see whether they could not find a basis for peace that would save plutocracy. For over a year a powerful group of the nobility and special interests, speaking through Lord Lansdowne, have been working for the same thing. A group of New York bankers recently listened to another banker without protest when he argued that it was a good thing for Germany to seize the Russian banks where it could and protect them from destruction. They have failed to save the German plutocrats, but they have one card left which they will use unless the people of the allied nations are thoroughly awake. They will try to force the governments to use allied troops to return the German plutocrats and nobility to power under the pretense of restoring order. There are many ways by which this can be put over if the allied governments are willing to be used. This big struggle is now on in desperate earnestness in every national capital.

What Germany Agreed To.

The terms of the armistice, as given out to the public, include the following:

- Cessation of hostilities. Evacuation of invaded territories, including Alsace-Lorraine and Luxembourg. Surrender of vast amounts of guns and other equipment. Evacuation of the left bank of the Rhine. Abandonment of the German treaties with Rumania and Russia. Reparation of the damages done. Surrender of scores of submarines and larger warcraft. Concentration of aircraft at stipulated points. Restoration of all allied merchant vessels. Duration of the armistice to be 30 days.

These drastic terms undoubtedly mean that the war is over, but the armistice will undoubtedly have to be extended because the peace conference can not be brought together within the time limit set.

Why Democrats Lost.

From the time when the results of the election became known, the country has been trying to interpret the swing against the party of the president. Several facts stand out in the explanations. The president made a partisan appeal immediately preceding the election and refused to take the voters into his confidence as to the issues involved. Instead of making a call for help against our imperialist and plundering elements, which have more than a small voice in the Democratic as well as the Republican party councils, he asked for the election of Democrats regardless of their position. His call should have been more about the line of the speech of Secretary Daniels at Providence, where Daniels said: "These men of the plunderbund are not thinking about patriotism, but about securing permanent peace or even about the war. They are thinking about after the war, and they are straining every nerve to secure a con-
