Red Cross Chapter in Annual Meeting Reviewed Work Done During Past Year

The annual meeting of the Kandiyohi County Chapter of the American Red Cross was held last night at the Masonic Building.

The chapter now consists of the following branches and auxiliaries, or working units.

Water Branch, with Lake Elizabeth, Thorpe and Harrison as auxiliaries.

Kandiyohi Branch, with Lake Lillian auxiliary.

Spicer Branch, with Green Lake, Lake Calhoun and West Irving auxiliaries.

New London Branch, with Colfax, Burbank and Regal auxiliaries.

Norway Lake Branch, Sunburg Branch.

Penock Branch, with West and East Manire and East St. Johns auxiliaries.

Raymond Branch, with Prinsburg as auxiliary.

Willmar Headquarters, with Svea, Roseland, Whitefield and Goldenrod as associated working units.

Mrs. Spicer expressed the gratitude of the chapter to the Masonic Building Association for the use of the rooms for the work of the Red Cross, and to the accommodating janitor, Mr. John Quam.

Every allotment and demand made upon the county chapter from District headquarters, has been met and more than met in some cases.

Memberships campaign as conducted throughout the county is state will be carried on in Kandiyohi County Dec. 2nd to 7th.

The Farm Bureau has been in operation in the county since the first of last April. A brief statement of some of the work may be of interest.

Fifty samples of shelled corn and a hundred fifty bushels of ear corn were tested for germination in the seed corn laboratory equipped and conducted by the Farm Bureau.

Through the Farm Bureau organization two hundred thirty farm hands were secured and located.

Thirty-one drainage systems were surveyed and planned, which means turning twelve hundred acres of wet land into general farm land.

Twenty-five farmers had trouble with sick live stock. State and Federal Veterinarians were secured through the Farm Bureau.

Four hundred fifty-six office calls during the past seven months have been made at the Farm Bureau Office at the Court House.
