Have you purchased the War Savings Stamps you pledged during the drive last June. A number of those pledges are still unredeemed, wholly or in part. As only about a month remains for redeeming these pledges, I would urge all who have made such pledges to purchase their stamps at once. After the 15th of December the holiday rush begins and it will be difficult to handle much war stamp business during the remainder of the month.

Card notices will be sent in a few days to all having unredeemed pledges at the post office. It is very likely that many persons have bought the stamps without asking to be credited on their cards so if you are in that class and get a card notice, please bring your certificate to the post office and get credit entered on your card. Persons who have purchased thrift stamps should bear in mind that they must complete their thrift cards and bring them in for exchange for War Savings Stamps before the end of December.

#### TO FINNEY.



News of the death of Pvt. Carlton V. Knott, while in action on the field of battle in France, came to his mother, Mrs. John Pfeifer of Raymond on Wednesday of last week. Carlton was a native of Kandiyohi county, being born at Prinsburg Oct. 4, 1893. He lived in the county until four years ago and is well known in the southwestern part of the county. He went west four years ago, and went to the war from Cour d'Alene, Idaho, for Camp Lewis, Wash., on June 30, 1918. He was afterwards transferred to California and Texas, stopping in each
