War Work

When the women of Minnesota were called to the colors none were more ready to respond than the members of the W. C. T. U. for our women are patriotic first, last and all the time. The war found us fairly well prepared for service, for several of our departments of work are closely allied to war work.

Minnesota has done her part in helping the National W. C. T. U. to raise three ambulances and 20 field kitchens in France, and 22 stereomicrographs in the cantonments in this country.

Besides all the special war work done by our organization, nearly every member of the W. C. T. U. is a member of the Red Cross and doing her share of the work in that organization. The state and local organizations and individuals have brought into the Red Cross, Y. W. and Y. M. C. A. drives. Many have registered with the Woman's Committee of National Defense in War Service. Then too, the women of the W. C. T. U., like all other women, have made the supreme sacrifice, the giving of their best beloved for service at the front. A service flag hangs in the window of a large majority of the W. C. T. U. homes and on some of them already the gold star covers the blue.

"The lost revenue is already made up by other forms of taxation without hardship or complaint, especially as the effect of prohibition is already becoming apparent in a decrease of crime and insanity and consequently of public burdens. States and cities have learned that they can get along without liquor revenue, capital has learned that it can find profitable use for property which was formerly applied to production of revenue, and workmen have found other jobs. The liquor traffic has disappeared and we have quickly closed the gaps which it left."

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Nationwide Prohibition Logical.

War efficiency and the liquor traffic have been treated in all bettering countries as irreconcilable enemies. Every military administrator recognizes it. Congress recognized it when it inserted in the selective conscription law provision forbidding the sale of alcoholic liquors to soldiers and sailors. And when congress went that far it admitted the logic of attempting to check or abolish the use of intoxicating liquors in every sphere as well as in the fighting zone and the training camps.—New York Tribune.
