ENTHUSIASTIC FARMERS INSPECT PACKING PLANT

J. S. Christenson Writes For The Kandiyohi County Delegation That Attended.

A number of leading friends of practical co-operation among the farmers of Kandiyohi county attended the large meeting of the stockholders of the Farmers Co-operative Packing Company of Newport, Minn., near South St. Paul.

Among those attending from this county were A. O. Nelson, Martin Swenson, Andrew P. Johnson, Ernest Swenson and Swan Nelson of the Svea Community.

"To describe in detail the doings at this convention would mean the writing of a book or probably books. The treasurer's report showed that this great co-operative corporation owns 184 acres of ground at Newport.

"Upon motion it was decided to raise by sale of stock from now until Sept. 1, funds so that the surplus will be at least \$1,000,000.

"Fellow farmers, who have read this and have seen what co-operation is doing in other lines—elevators, stores, shipping associations, etc.—let me tell you that I firmly believe that the co-operative packing plant at Newport owned by at least 10,000 shareholders residing in the states named, has come into existence to stay.

"Mr. Brooks, the designer and superintendent of construction, a man of over twenty-five years experience in the packing plant business addressed the meeting. He announced that the plant would be ready to operate in next September.
