Olivia Miss. Feb. 25—Darwin S. Hall, 75 years old, for several years mayor of this town and one of the best known pioneers in this section of Minnesota, died today at his home. He had been in ill health ever since an operation a year ago. The funeral will be conducted at 1 p. m. Tuesday. Mr. Hall came to Minnesota in 1866 from Wisconsin. He became county Auditor of Hennepin county in 1889 and later clerk of district court. In 1876 he was elected to the state legislature and became state senator in 1884, serving two terms. He served two years as Congressman from the Third district in 1890. President Harrison appointed him chairman of the Chippewa Indian Commission in 1892. Mr. Hall, after leaving Congress, returned to his farm in Hennepin county, but always retained an interest in public affairs. In 1878 he founded and for several years edited the "Herald," a weekly paper. He was a member of the State Historical society and the State Horticultural society. Mr. Hall was a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Willmar, Minn., Elks lodge. Mrs. Hall died two years ago. Mr. Hall is survived by his wife, Mrs. E. W. Hall, and a niece.—Minneapolis Tribune.

Olivia Miss. Feb. 25—Darwin S. Hall, 75 years old, for several years mayor of this town and one of the best known pioneers in this section of Minnesota, died today at his home. He had been in ill health ever since an operation a year ago. The funeral will be conducted at 1 p. m. Tuesday. Mr. Hall came to Minnesota in 1866 from Wisconsin. He became county Auditor of Hennepin county in 1889 and later clerk of district court. In 1876 he was elected to the state legislature and became state senator in 1884, serving two terms. He served two years as Congressman from the Third district in 1890. President Harrison appointed him chairman of the Chippewa Indian Commission in 1892. Mr. Hall, after leaving Congress, returned to his farm in Hennepin county, but always retained an interest in public affairs. In 1878 he founded and for several years edited the "Herald," a weekly paper. He was a member of the State Historical society and the State Horticultural society. Mr. Hall was a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Willmar, Minn., Elks lodge. Mrs. Hall died two years ago. Mr. Hall is survived by his wife, Mrs. E. W.
