

DR. JACOBS APPOINTED AIDE TO DISABLED RETURNING MEN

What Uncle Sam Will Do for His Crippled Heroes. Call at Carlson Block for Information.

Does your disabled soldier or sailor boy know what Uncle Sam is ready and eager to do for him? As an act of simple justice, urged by pride and gratitude, the American Government is determined that he shall have a "fair shake" in the battle of life to which he is returning after being broken and maimed in the struggle with autocracy. The Federal Government will train him in a calling in which he can overcome his handicap, whether retreating involves a four year college course or a few months shop experience. Uncle Sam will foot all the bills.

But there are thousands of crippled fighters who are not aware of their rights. To help them back to independence, Congress has appropriated \$2,000,000 for their re-education if their disability prevents them from returning to their old jobs. Congress passes without a dissenting vote the law under which the Federal Board for Vocational Education is charged with getting a job, if he will accept this help, for every disabled soldier or sailor entitled to Compensation under the War Risk Insurance Act.

The Federal Board is already functioning and depends only by the courtesy of reaching all the men entitled to its assistance. To help in this work, the Board is enlisting the aid of the American Red Cross.

Dr. Jno. C. Jacobs has been appointed Vocational Aide on the Home service Committee of Kandiyohi County, to assist the Federal Board in reaching every disabled man returning to this county. He will be very glad to meet any returned soldier in his office in Carlson Block.

Road Graveled to Kandiyohi Lake.

Olivia people will have a gravelled road to drive on nearly all the way to Kandiyohi Lake this coming summer, which will be good news to many people here who patronize that popular summer resort. Plans have been made for graveling the stretch of road from W. A. Lindquist's corner, one mile east and thence north to the lake. Albert Rodellus and Adolph Vick of Kandiyohi county solicited subscriptions in town last week for a fund to pay for graveling and the business men here donated liberally, the donations running as high as \$50 for one individual.

This is a movement that will prove of benefit to a large number of people and it should be liberally supported by the people of the village. While many have already contributed to the fund there are others who will undoubtedly desire to do so when given an opportunity. It might be well for the Commercial Club to take this matter up at the next meeting and help the good work along.—Olivia Times.



NOTICE TO CLEAN UP PREMISES

Official Notice of Health Officer of Willmar to Owners of Property at Willmar.

(Official Notice) All persons owning, occupying or otherwise possessing any houses, buildings, lots or any other real estate within the city limits of the city of Willmar are hereby notified that all manure, debris, animal and vegetable material liable to decomposition shall be removed, and that all houses, barns, sheds, stables, privy vaults, sewers, cellars, wells, yards and premises shall be thoroughly cleaned, and all filth or source of filth which can or may prove injurious to the health of the inhabitants of said city shall be abated by May 1, 1919.

The city shall see that all public streets, alleys, highways, sewers and buildings within the city cleaned of all filth and causes thereof. Any person having knowledge of any contagious or infectious diseases within the city is hereby notified and required to report the same as soon as or within twenty-four hours from the time it became known to them to the health officer or to any member of the board; or any person knowing of glanders in horses or pleuro-pneumonia in cattle, within said city shall report the same. No person at any time shall burn any rubbish, such as straw and droppings from cattle, within the limits of the city of Willmar, and any person who willfully violates it shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than ten dollars for each and every offense.

Teachers and superintendents of schools and public institutions will see that no children having a contagious disease or any child coming from a house or houses in which said disease is said to exist, be admitted into such school or institution without first notifying and obtaining permission from the board of health. All keepers of hotels or rooming houses shall notify the board of health of any contagious disease within 24 hours from the discovery of the same. All cases reported to this board by any person will be properly investigated as provided by law.
