OBITUARY

JOHN OLSON.

John Olson was born in Norway December 23rd, 1859. He passed away on Monday, April 28th, 1919, shortly after midnight at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Carl Bakken of this city. He had suffered from cancer of the stomach for more than a year so death came as a relief to him.

At the age of five years he came to America with his parents and settled in Meeker county. In 1881, March 1st, he was married to Mathilda Marie Williamson. The first year of their married life was spent at Ada, Minnesota. Later they moved to Meeker county on a farm. He has also lived at Towner, N. Dak. for four years and in the Township of Dovre for twenty-five years.

The last three years he has made his home at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Carl Bakken in this city. Those who mourn his departure are two brothers and one sister living in Canada, one sister in Oregon, one at Litchfield and one in Grove City, one brother, O. B. Olson, Willmar and one daughter, Mrs. L. H. Sletten, Litchfield. His daughter Lillie Madora passed away last October from influenza.

The other children are Mrs. S. B. Reimingen of Doyleston, Minn.; Mrs. A. B. Densgertsen, 1. Christianson, Mrs. C. L. Bakken, Mrs. C. M. Baklund and Gladys of Doyleston. There are seven grandchildren. Funeral services were held at 3:00 o'clock at the Benson residence, at 4:00 o'clock at the Solomon Lake church, Rev. J. N. Anderson officiating. There were many beautiful floral offerings from relatives and friends. Mrs. Tom Thompson, sister, and husband of Grove City attended the funeral. Interment was made in the Solomon Lake cemetery. The pall bearers were: John Floren, O. R. Sletten, I. W. Alme, T. O. Sletten, O. N. Elgros and A. C. Bergman.

BERNARD KLEVEN. Benhard Kleven of the Township of Green Lake, passed away at the Deaconess Hospital, Minneapolis, Saturday, April 26th, 1919 following a serious operation for cancer which he had undergone four days before. He was born at Vigten, Norway, February 13th, 1854. The first thirty-six years of his life were spent in the land of his birth. Upon coming to America he bought a farm in the Township of Green Lake where he lived up to the time of his death. Mrs. Kleven passed away ten years ago. Eight children are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father. They are: Arthur and Evelyn in the home place; Carl and Mrs. Joseph Noid east of Kerkhoven; Louis, Brockton, Clara and Ruth of Minneapolis and David of Kandiyohi. All were present at the funeral which took place last Wednesday at the Eagle Lake church, Rev. E. O. Larson officiating. Two sons were buried by the side of their father. Mrs. Kleven was for many years a trustee of his church, and for eleven years a member of the school board. He deceased and one brother and four sisters in Norway also one sister, Mrs. John Fornes of Hawick. Those of whom attended the funeral from a distance were a nephew Conrad Olsvik of Brinemade, N. Dak., and Mrs. Edw. Hultad of Minneapolis. The interment was made in the cemetery adjoining the church. Pall bearers were: Charley Noid, Charley Anderson, Casper Aune, Peder Erickson, Ole Erickson and Cornelius Aune.

MRS. BEN HALVERSON. Mrs. Florence Halverson, the beloved wife of Bennie Halverson, of Minneapolis, died at Tucson, Arizona last Saturday, May 3rd, after an illness of about eight months, at an age of thirty-seven years.

The deceased was a daughter of Mrs. Ella Shelgren of Kerkhoven at which place she was born and grew to womanhood. Her birthday was March 4, 1882. She was married to Mr. Halverson on September 15, 1909. They resided at Norway Lake until October, 1916, when they moved to Minneapolis. She was in ill health and had sojournd for her health in the south west since last fall.

Mourning her untimely death she leaves a sorrowing husband, a bereft and widowed mother. Her father and a sister and brother have gone before. Other relatives are P. H. Frye of Willmar, Frank Noland, formerly of Kerkhoven, Aaron Shelgren an uncle at Little Fork, Minn.

The funeral was held at Norway Lake today, Revs. Njus and Stotendahl officiating.

Mrs. Anna Erickson of the Township of Green Lake passed away May 1st, 1919 at 3:00 o'clock p. m. at the home of her son Ole O. Erickson after an illness of seven weeks. She was 76 years, 11 months and 3 days old.

Mrs. Erickson was born in Sweden May 28th, 1842. Together with her husband she came to this country in 1868 and settled on a homestead in Cass Lake township. Her husband passed away six years ago, and one son Enoch died last October. She leaves seven sons and three daughters besides several grandchildren. The funeral was held Monday afternoon, May 5th, at the Eagle Lake church, Rev. E. O. Larson officiating, assisted by Rev. Nicolay Nilson of Willmar. The pallbearers were: Conrad Peterson, C. A. Halverson, J. K. Anderson, O. M. Anderson, C. Aune and Peter Erickson. Interment was made in the cemetery adjoining the church.
