OBITUARY

MRS STROMME L. JOHNSON. Mrs. Laura Othella (Owre) Johnson whose demise was briefly mentioned last week was born in Tromso, Norway, September 9th, 1858. She passed away on May 6th, 1919 at the North-western hospital in Minneapolis, death being due to septic poisoning caused by tonsillitis. She had just recovered from an operation for hernia when she contracted a cold which developed into tonsillitis. She was ill but two weeks.

The deceased came to America when she was three years old. Her early youth was spent in Chicago, St. Peter and Greenleaf, Minn. Her education was received in the public school of St. Peter and Hutchinson. She was one of the early teachers in Meeker and Kandiyohi counties. Her home has been in the township of East Lake Lillian since she was ten years old when she came there with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Owre well known throughout the county. In the year 1880 she was married to Stromme L. Johnson of Thorpe who together with the children left to mourn a kind and loving mother. The children are: Elvin, Leonard, Irene of Thorpe, Mrs. W. S. Ladd, Ruth, Vivian, Orion of Minneapolis, Clifford of Olvia and Ira in the U. S. service. There are also four grandchildren and four sisters living. The sisters are Mrs. M. C. Anderson of Thorpe and Mrs. J. A. Giantvalley of St. Paul; Mrs. J. F. Rossmo of Chicago.

The deceased was a member of the Royal Neighbor Lodge of Bird Island and an active member of the East Lake Lillian Cemetery Improvement Club since its organization. The funeral was held at the East Lake Lillian Baptist church, Friday, May 9th, Rev. Lagergren of Fahlun officiated. The floral tributes were many testifying of a large number of friends. Mrs. Adolph Erickson and Miss Esther Erickson sang two duets, "Face to Face" and "Till We Meet Beyond the River." Orion Stromm, daughter of the departed one sang "Saved by Grace." The pallbearers were H. A. Rasmussen, H. A. Sobnitz, S. A. Gilhol, John A. Vick, Jesse Summerlet and H. E. Olson. Interment was made in the East Lake Lillian Baptist cemetery.

MARIE HAROLDSON.

Last Thursday, May 8th, the sad news came of the death of Marie Haroldson a teacher of county schools and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Alfred Haroldson of Whitefield. The funeral occurred at a hospital in Willmar caused by typhoid fever following an operation for appendicitis. She was teaching in Dist. No. 5 in Lake Lillian when she was taken ill. She is mourned by her parents and the following brothers and sisters:

Nettie (Mrs. Walter Skoglund); Olga, Anton, Anna, Nora, Harry, Maynard and Clinton. Also by two uncles, Jens Isaacson of Svea and Nils Isaacson of White Rock, S. Dak. The funeral took place Sunday, May 11th, Rev. J. B. Sorenson officiated. Services were held at the Svea church. There were songs by the choir and Samuel Nelson and Mrs. S. A. Peterson of Minneapolis spoke. The pallbearers were Lawrence Johnson, William Olson, Walter Swenson, Edgar Bangston, Edgar Mattson and Clarence Bangston. Cora Marie Haroldson was born at Prinsburg June 19th, 1897. She attended the common school and the Willmar high school. The family lived at Ogilvie seven years but moved back to the county to Whitefield township twelve years ago. Marie has been teaching in the county schools the past three years. She was well liked by pupils and parents and had a large circle of friends who are very much grieved to hear of her death and sympathize with the bereaved family.

ED. J. JOHNSON.

Ed. J. Johnson, son of Dr. Christian Johnson died this morning. He sustained an injury to his spine in a fall yesterday, and it proved so serious that death resulted. His sudden demise is a great shock to the family and a large circle of friends. Deceased was born at New London, May 30, 1892. He attended the public school and High School at Willmar, and later took the degree of B. A. in medicine at the University of North Dakota. He was assistant professor of Pathology in the North Dakota University. He has been at home during the last eight months. In 1902 he met with the misfortune of losing his left leg by accidental shooting. He leaves to mourn his death his wife, nee Martha Sorenson, his father and the following brothers and sisters: Fred C. J. Ramsing of Anaconda, Mont.; Miss Hannah Johnson of International Falls and Dr. Hans Johnson of Kerkhoven. He leaves no children. The arrangements for the funeral have not yet been made at this writing.
