





Such new bids to include extension of sewer to the "call" and also a 350 ft. extension on South 5th Street.

John Nelson, Arthur Dalein and John Peterson were granted sewer permits for each of the respective residences in Larson's addition to connect with the 4th Street East sewer, and Peter Bohm was granted a permit to connect with the 12th Street West sewer, and the 7th street, Alvin Skjette for residence on Lot 3 of Block 68 to connect with the 12th Street West sewer, and Henry Johnson for new residence on Lot 8 of Block 44 to connect with the 3rd Street W. sewer. All of the aforesaid permits subject to the \$50. tapping fee.

Commencing at the man-hole on Fifth Street and Grace Avenue, and thence running North along Fifth Street, a distance of approximately 100 feet to the man-hole at the intersection of Fifth Street and Twelfth Street, thence terminating there.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That said sewer is to be constructed upon the express condition and not otherwise, that the City of Willmar shall contribute at least the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars towards the expense of constructing the same, each individual property owner contributing a tapping fee for each Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars, and contributors to be granted a tapping fee of each Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars contributed.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the plans and specifications for the construction of said sewer prepared by Engineer Rowat and now on file with the City Clerk, be, and the same are hereby adopted as the plans and specifications for the construction of said sewer, the same to be open for public inspection at the City Clerk's office, on or before August 27th, 1919.

Fluent Speakers Instruct Large Crowd Concerning Good Roads. Music by Willmar Band.

The Good Roads Social held at the Svea park last Friday evening was a successful success from the opening number by the Willmar Band to the closing remarks of the last speaker. Estimates place the number in attendance at two thousand, having from six townships.

The program commenced at eight o'clock with the band furnishing the opening number. As usual they were roundly applauded. Attorney Charles Johnson was the first speaker of the evening and chose as his center topic "Laws Governing the Construction of Public Highways at the Present Time," and then analyzed the proposed State constitutional amendment and the county seat.

State Highway Engineer Charles Forbes of St. Paul reviewed the wide scope of work accomplished by the Highway Commission and showed the rapid stride of development in the construction of good roads.

Mr. County Agent Rodegus was the concluding speaker and chose to represent the local farmer, setting forth his views upon the subject of good roads.
