

A STATE FESTIVAL?

"Why not make Seed Corn Time—September 10-20—an annual state-wide festival in Minnesota, closing with community celebrations in every part of the state?"

Andrew Boss, vice director of the Minnesota experiment station, widely known to the farmers of Minnesota, asks this question.

Corn's Gift to Minnesota.
"Seed corn selection," says Professor Boss, "in less than 50 years has lifted Minnesota from the ranks of a no-corn state to eleventh place among the corn commonwealths of the union; has stretched the corn belt northward from the southeast corner of the state clear to the extreme northwest corner; has improved the quality of the corn that all select—More than enough corn to build up the livestock industry; has aided in maintaining the fertility of the soil; and by keeping farms clean has helped to reduce the annual tax which weeds levy upon the farmer."

Last year's corn crop was worth about \$99,000,000 to Minnesota's farmers, an amount equal to more than \$600 for every farmer in the state."

"In view of all this the time of gathering seed corn for each year—Seed Corn Time—September 10-20—might well be approached in a spirit of festivity, and might well close with a community holiday in celebration of the insurance of the corn crop for the following year insofar as good seed may insure a crop."

The question is: What community will be the first to adopt this plan, and how far will other communities follow suit?

"Let Us Forget."
That corn-growers may not forget, in their planning for a "celebration," that the first thing to do at this time of year is to select seed corn, the agricultural extension division of the University of Minnesota is urging that all select—More than enough corn to build up the livestock industry; ears of medium size and good variety; ears that hang down; Ears with kernels that are well denting, that fill all the space on the cob and are well shaped.

Then all who have gathered their seed corn are further urged to store it where it will dry quickly and freeze.
