THE FUTURE OF THE RED CROSS

The Branch Should Have a Voice

After listening to a thorough discussion of the different phases of future Red Cross activities as applied to the different communities, we do not want you to leave this conference with the idea that each department is distinct unto itself. It is the co-ordination of all these activities that is necessary in order to obtain the best results. We do not want to forget that there is but one Red Cross, and that it stands for service. In studying community needs, the county should always be considered as the working unit. Great effort should be made to develop and strengthen the branches of the Red Cross because it is through them that the county as a whole will be reached. During the war when production played such an important part, the interest of the branch was measured in proportion to the number of articles produced, but the same yard stick cannot be used under existing conditions. The Peace Program cannot be carried on successfully by a well balanced organization. In other words, the Chapter should pass on to the Branch, and the Branch should adopt every phase of the work as far as possible. Reports of our field representatives indicate that there is not always the closest co-operation between the Chapters and Branches, and we think much of this can be overcome by giving the Branches a voice in the government of their Chapters. Funds are being raised by them through their membership drives, and they are entitled to the same consideration as Chapter representatives in being given a voice in the expenditure of their funds. It is now almost time for the annual election of officers. Elect for your Chapter and Branch officers men and women interested in health problems as applied to your local communities. Develop and renew the interest of your Branches, and we suggest that you appoint the chairman of the Branch as a member of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee should be representative of the Branches and include one of each standing committee by virtue of the position, should be a member of the Executive Committee.—Mrs. F. L. Fridley.
