Peace Program of Red Cross. To preserve old life; promote rural hygiene; to combat disease and educate the public in matters of health.

Chapter committees will be well organized in the way of public health nursing; home care of the sick and first aid and if the influenza returns this year they are expected to make a survey of local health facilities.

Number of available beds, emergency hospital facilities, social service, motor and canteen resources, Chapter funds can be used in an emergency for influenza work.

Although the obligations of the Red Cross for foreign relief has not been discharged and finished, the primary purpose of the Red Cross will be to serve America.

Completion of the care of soldier and sailor's families, and extending to civilians the same service which it has offered to the families of soldiers and sailors, will be the peace time work of the home service. First Aid Bureau will organize classes in first aid and life saving, from the factories.

MRS. MARY BREM. A few minutes after the hour of midnight between Wednesday and Thursday of last week Mrs. Mary Brem, one of the first residents of Willmar, passed away in death after a two weeks' illness.

Mrs. Mary Brem, whose parents were Mathias and Rosalia Flacker, was born in Berlin, Germany, on March 27th, 1852.

When she was but a baby of six months her parents came to America, making their home in Chicago for two years and then coming to Delano, Minn. During the Indian outbreak they went to St. Paul where the deceased lived until she came to Willmar in 1870.

She was married to Jacob Brem March 2, 1872. They had two daughters, Bertha Brem and Mrs. John C. Freese, all of Willmar. She also leaves two brothers, Wm. Flacker of Minn. and Edw. Flacker of Herman, Minn., and two sisters, Mrs. Ida Istad of Minneapolis, and Mrs. Hans Bend of Andover, S. D.

The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. from the residence, Rev. F. H. Oehler officiating. A quartet consisting of Mrs. Rowet, Mrs. Hahn, Miss Carlson and Rev. Oehler sang at the occasion.

The pall bearers were A. E. Rice, M. D. Manning, Rasmus Korthe, Ole Barnstad, Chris Ackerman and G. P. Karwan.

MRS. NILS OLSON. Mrs. Nils Olson, a good and true Christian woman and a resident of Kandiyohi county for a period of forty years, died at her home, 616 Third St. East, last Saturday at the advanced age of 83 years and 9 months.

She had been falling only during the last eight weeks from infirmities of old age which were the cause of her death.

Mrs. Farnilla Olson was born on the 25th day of January, 1836 at Kjelvinge, Malmbus lan, Sweden. She was married to Nils Olson March 24, 1856 and three years later, 1859, she came with her husband to America, locating on a homestead in Section 14, Town of Whitefield. Here with her husband she took her full part in the early development of that community.

She was a charter member of the Oleson Lutheran church in 1892 she moved with her husband to Willmar where she has been a faithful member of the Bethel church.

She is mourned by her husband, N. Olson of Svea, and a daughter, Mrs. John Sandin of Willmar. With the latter she has made her home since the death of her husband which occurred March 7th, 1917.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at one o'clock at the Bethel Lutheran church, Rev. Holmquist officiating. The remains were taken to Svea where services were held jointly with those over the remains of Nils Olson, another of the early pioneers of Whitefield who had passed away on Sunday. The interment took place in the Svea church yard.
