

CO-OP. CREAMERY FOR RAYMOND

Two County Agents Are Canvassing Situation and Securing Pledges for Cows.

An effort is being made to organize a Farmers Co-operative Creamery Association for Raymond. The plan is before organizing to have at least 700 cows pledged for local creamery. We know that this number of cows will turn in about 100,000 pounds of butterfat yearly which will maintain a good thriving creamery. Each man that signs the list gives his address, number of cows he milks and the number of shares he will take in the proposed creamery association with the understanding that if enough shares or cows are not obtained by Dec. 1st, the whole thing becomes null or void. County Agent Hubby of Chippewa County and County Agent Redog of Kandiyohi County have been called on to help canvass the situation. At the present time considerable work has been done and a number of shares have been subscribed. Practically every one believes that a good Co-operative Creamery for Raymond will be a good thing. It is felt by those interested that enough cows and shares can be secured or pledged to the Association during the next week or ten days to assure the success of the creamery undertaking. Every other town in Kandiyohi County, even part of the inland towns, have creameries. "Why should not Raymond? Raymond is a good shipping point, a good trading center with plenty of territory to draw from. Other Creamery Associations organized and managed as the one proposed for Raymond are making good throughout the State. Interest is paid annually upon the stock on shares invested. If the creamery has been in operation for a year or so share holders who plan on selling out or moving away may turn in their shares and receive the full cash value of their shares. Whatever profit is made by the Association is divided up in whatever manner the Association officers may see fit. Usually it reverts back to the farmers bringing in cream in proportions to the amount of cream delivered during the year. Why not make the cream into butter and ship the finished product?
