OBITUARY

ANDREW GUSTRUD.

Andrew Gustrud died on Friday morning at 11 o'clock, November 21, 1919, at the home of his sister, Mrs. E. O. Hagen. The cause of his death was cancerous growth in the digestive tract, an ailment that confined him to his home here, an invalid, for nearly a year. Gustrud was born in Elkskov, Norway, January 9th, 1856, and came to this country in 1870. The family home was at Dovre. In 1914 he moved to New London. Two years later he moved to Willmar, and after

illness came upon him, and he was operated upon at a Willmar Hospital. He returned to his sister's home here to await the final summons. She, alone, was with him when his last sleep settled peacefully over him.

He was buried from the Long Lake Lutheran church. Revs. E. M. Hanson of New London and A. M. Lund of Spicer officiating. At the services at the house Rev. Hanson led in prayer and scripture reading and made a few remarks from the text in Rom. 8: 32. The foundation for our salvation is the love of God revealed when he gave His Son for us all, and furthermore will give us everything through Him—victory in life and death. At the church Rev. Lund spoke of Enoch (Genesis 5:24) how he walked with God and was not, for God took him. Rev. Hanson spoke on Paul's Epistle to the Philippians 3: 20-21 what we are and what we shall become.

The pallbearers were: E. C. Hagen, John Sundby, Arnold Gustrud, Oscar Gustrud, Carl Ilang and Albert Thorsvig. Mr. Gustrud leaves to mourn his loss only three immediate relatives: the sisters, Mrs. E. O. Hagen of New London, Mrs. John Sundby of Minneapolis and Miss Bertha Gustrud of Willmar, all of whom were present at the funeral. Mr. Gustrud had many friends in New London who regret the passing of this kind and Christian gentleman.
