MRS. ERICK HOLT. Mrs. Anna Petrina Holt, beloved wife of the wellknown Willmar citizen, Mr. Erick Holt, passed away at noon today. The obsequies take place next Sunday afternoon at two o'clock from the Lutheran Free church, Rev. Nicolay Nilsen to officiate. A more complete obituary notice will appear in our next issue.

OLE LARSON. Ole Larson Jorgensen died at the W. B. Hanson home last Wednesday, December 10, after an illness of five weeks. He suffered a stroke of paralysis some time ago. He was born in Norway August 5, 1835. He came to this country in 1872 and resided on a farm at Canby until 1904 when he moved to Willmar.

His wife and three children have one to the great beyond before the husband and father. The funeral took place last Monday at 10:00 o'clock at the house. Rev. S. T. Norman of St. Paul officiated. The remains were buried at the Synod church cemetery.

Ole G. LIGAARDEN. Ole G. LIGAARDEN one of the first settlers in the township of Norway Lake, died suddenly at his home Monday evening, December 8th. The cause of his death was apparently a stroke of apoplexy. Although the deceased had been in feeble health for a number of years no one thought that the end was so near. In a happy and cheerful mood he was sitting with his family at the supper table when he fell dead. The last audible words he said was, "God help me." Mr. LIGAARDEN was born in Telemarken, Norway, 1842 and came to this country about 45 years ago and settled on the farm now owned by B. K. Peterson, and where the town site of Sunberg mainly lies. Deceased leaves a widow and six children: Geoline, (Mrs. H. E. Olson) who lives on a farm adjoining the old homestead; Nettie, (Mrs. Schegel) of Minneapolis; Gunder LIGAARDEN of Fortuna, Divide county, North Dakota; Christine of Huron, South Dakota; Mary, (Mrs. Theodore Finstad) of Willmar; and Elmer, the youngest, who is living at the home and has taken care of the parents in their declining years. The mother has been a cripple and an invalid for the last six years. The funeral took place at the West Norway Lake church where Rev. M. Sotendahl preached the funeral sermon, taking for the text, Genesis 5:23.
