Edwin Peterson of Oakland, Oregon left Tuesday for a visit at the Carleton College at Northfield.


Atwater, April 5.—Paul Covell returned this morning to resume his studies at the Carleton College at Northfield.

John Brown spent last Thursday on business in the Twin Cities. A new Toledo scale was installed at the Geo. Roetzler meat market this morning.





Organize Shipstead Clubs Now that the convention has been held and candidates endorsed the next step is to proceed to organize in order to put them over at the June primaries.


