FRANK STANSBERRY INSTANTLY KILLED

Falls While Trying to Escape from Burning Hotel at Grand Forks.

The distressing news that Frank J. Stansberry, former resident of Willmar, had been killed in a hotel fire at Grand Forks, N. D., shocked our people last Friday.

Dashed upon an iron grating when a rope of knotted sheets, by which he was trying to escape from a burning hotel, tore away, Frank J. Stansberry of Minneapolis was instantly killed today at Grand Forks, N. D.

Alarmed by the smoke and by the cries of "fire," occupants rushed from their rooms. They swarmed upon the fire escapes and ran about barefooted on the gravelled roof, seeking to escape.

FIRE DESTROYS ATWATER STORE

The G. A. Stark Store Burns To Ground Causing Loss of Over \$60,000.

Fire started in the upstairs of the G. A. Stark and Co. store building at Atwater Monday forenoon. For a time it threatened destruction to an entire block, and it is estimated to have accompanied damage of the sum of \$60,000, at least, according to reports of Mr. Stark, the proprietor.

The origin of the fire is believed to have been from the stove pipe upstairs, and when the fire reached the stock of mattresses in the second story, it was very rapid.

Reuben Peterson, the manager, was badly injured when he went inside the burning building to bring out some dynamite.
