The South St. Paul market, however, has occupied a relatively high position among the River Markets during the week, the break in cattle prices being less than at other River markets, and the average price of hogs being from 25c to 75c higher than at other points.

Hogs closed the week around 60c lower than last Saturday's closing. Top hogs went today at \$11.10 with a bulk of \$12.55 to 12.90. Heavy packer hogs were bought in with the rest of the hogs generally through the prices were lower when sold separate. The better kind of packers, however, were practically no trade for the week were 35.000.

Steer trade shows a decline of from two to four cents from the top of the week. Well finished steers are selling for \$11.25 to 11.50 with the in-between kind for \$8.25 to 9.00. Cows and heifers have not dropped quite so much as steers. Most kinds of butcher cows sell for \$6.25 to 7 with some at as high as \$10.50. Cutters, canners and bulls were drab and showed an uneven market for \$4.00 to 5.00. Run of veal calves is \$12 with other kinds at closing prices.

Sheep receipts were very light this week. Some lambs went at \$12 to 16 with the bulk of \$8.25 to 9.00. The fatness on killer lambs is \$8 to 19. Ewes sold around \$12 with a number ranging from \$4 to 6. There has been practically no trade in wethers and yearlings wethers being quotable at 14 to 16 with some at 18 to 20.

The indications now are that the railroad congestion in Chicago and the East will be relieved next week and better outlet should be provided for all kinds of stock.
