

60 Ton Miles of Motor Truck Freight Per Person

DURING 1917 (latest authentic figures available) motor trucks hauled 60 tons of freight a mile for every person in the United States. Then the country was at war and the capacity of the railroads was overtaxed.

It is doubtful if even a small percentage of this enormous tonnage could have been moved except by motor trucks.

To the Housekeepers of Willmar
In our efforts to suppress the use of extracts and sirups containing alcohol as beverage to comply with the prohibition laws, it would be of material assistance if the use of alcoholic extracts for household purposes might be discouraged and non-alcoholic extracts used instead.

The state of Montana, we understand, has prohibited the use of extracts dissolved in alcohol, and the trade there supplies the housekeepers and bakers with extracts in paste form in collapsible tubes. It is likely that the next legislature in Minnesota will adopt a similar law, and eventually our good women will find it necessary to use the new kind of extracts. Why not adopt their use now, and help in discouraging the use of the alcoholic kinds. We ask for the cooperation of the housekeepers and cooks of the City of Willmar.
