FORT SNELLING DEFEATS WILLMAR

Visitors Secure their Runs in Initial Inning—Fast Playing By Both Teams

The 49th Infantry from Fort Snelling defeated the local team in a fast and exciting game at the local ball park on Labor Day by the tune of 4 to 3. Fort Snelling scored their only runs in the first inning with a walk and four singles. Willmar scored two of their three runs in the sixth on four hits and an error. The last tally was scored in the eighth by Hartwick. Roy Christian pitched a splendid game and allowed only five hits, struck out 13 men and allowed no runs. Lamb made two singles, hit by pitcher and made a great fly to left field of which Hopson made a running one hand catch.
