SOLDIERS TAKE DOUBLE PROGRAM

Fort Snelling Defeats Willmar in Both Clashes. Ragged Playing. Free Hitting

A dispiriting cloud hung over the local baseball outfit last Saturday and Sunday. Fort Snelling apparently came down here with the intention to wipe the grounds with Willmar and despite the efforts of the locals succeeded in bunting their hits and tallying sufficient runs in one inning alone to secure several runs. The soldier squad brought along their veteran hurler, Last, who did the mound work on Saturday and threw a good brand of ball. When hits meant runs the boy Last, lashed and weathered the dangerous inning and although he allowed 9 hits was able to keep them scattered. It was in the fatal third that the visitors chalked up six grouped runs in their frame of the inning. Seven hits, two errors, several pitchers and a base on balls netted the Snelling team their six runs which clinched the victory. In the fifth inning Willmar came back with what appeared as a strong rally but only 2 runs crossed the plate. Last struck out 11 men and Christian seven. The score at the close of the game stood 7 to 3 in favor of Fort Snelling. Although the weather was threatening throughout the afternoon the game was thrashed before the shower came. A large crowd was present despite the bad climatic outlook. Zalusky and Carlisle for Willmar, who arrived to assist the locals, showed up well. The box score:

Sunday's game was a duplicate of Saturday's performance only with a little more accent on it. Plenty of fumbles, wild throws, free connections at the stick and a host of other base ball faults contributed to the lack of interest on the part of the crowd which was one of the largest during the season. The weather was ideal, the crowd in the mood for a good sample of base ball, and every indication of a base ball royal. Gunder, the hurler who was slated to do the throwing for Willmar, failed to appear on the grounds and "Lefty" Hawkland entered the box. Hawkland went along nicely for four innings when the Willmar management decided to allow Christian a turn at it. In that inning 8 runs were added up for the visitors. Five hits, some of several sacks, a number of errors, some steals, wild placed sacrifices and a base on ball were responsible for the heavy base running and scoring. Errors and bonehead plays were common on both sides and all pitchers were touched freely. Schwab at times showed a strong swatting tendency in the fourth inning when four runs crossed the plate, due to several clear hits and errors on the infield. Kieley struck out in this frame but the catcher let it drop. Schwab will to first and by successful bunt throws and fumbles on the part of the first and second baseman made the circuit and annexed a run. Four bases on a dropped strike. In this inning Bob Anderson hoisted a wallop to deep left field that third base sacks on it. The crowd anticipated a circuit drive but the outer man fielded it in too quickly. Zalusky behind the bat for Willmar caught a visiting soldier for a third time in a good exhibition of baseball, alertness and speedy ball. The box score:
