COUNTY DUROC ASS'N REVIEWS YEAR'S WORK

Litter Clubs Feature of Year. Interest Accentuated in Duroc Breeding

Last winter the Kandiyoohi County Duroc Breeders Association was organized. Aside from the general effect of the County Organization and the advertising done to the public connected with such an Association the Duroc Sow and Litter Club Work conducted with the boys and girls during the past season has been the most notable phase of work accomplished.

Fourteen bred girls were placed, thirteen of these purchased by the Association. The locations were as widely distributed and as good as could be selected. The boys and girls did exceptionally well in entering into the spirit of co-operation. In this way the boys and girls were interested and educated in the possibilities of handling good pure bred Durocs. The relatives and friends in many cases became interested and enthusiastic about Durocs. As a result more pure bred Durocs have been purchased, not only that but they have become more widely distributed throughout the county. This year a new Hog barn was put up on the Fair Grounds and filled beyond its capacity with mostly good Durocs. This was made possible and due largely to the efforts of the County Duroc Ass'n. The boys and girls made a splendid showing with their well grown litters. It is impossible to estimate accurately the value of this showing to the breeders of the Reds in this county.

Let's keep the good work going by getting better acquainted and butting up a good strong live County Duroc Association. Next Saturday at 2 p. m. November 27th, 1920, at the Court House there will be a meeting of the Duroc Breeders of the County. Plans will be discussed for the coming year and every breeder of Durocs is urged to be present.

LAKE LILLIAN VETERAN DROWNS

Freeman Stafford, First Drafted Man From County, Dies in Lake Waters

Freeman Stafford of Lake Lillian township, was drowned in Lake Lillian last Monday evening about ten thirty o'clock. He was returning to his home on the northwest shore from a skating party held near the Melbye place on the southeast shore of the lake. The unfortunate man did not skate along the shore but took the risk of skating a distance towards the center. His cries for help as he broke thru the ice were heard at the Melbye home. They became alarmed and went at once to the home of Free-

Freeman Stafford was a respected young man and was well liked by his neighbors. He was the first called from Kandiyoohi County under the selective draft act, his draft number being 258, the first number at the drawing in Washington.

Freeman went to Camp Dodge with the first contingent, consisting of 90 men, leaving Willmar Sept. 23, 1917. He arrived in France on May 1, 1918, ranked as a private, serving with Co. A, 4th Ammunition Train as a motor cycle dispatcher. He returned home from overseas in August 1919, having thus served 23 months in the World War.

Freeman Stafford was born Feb. 23, 1896, at Greenwood, Wis. His parents died when he was a little boy and ever since that time he has made his home with his uncle, Ole Selmonson, who resides in Lake Lillian township. The day for the funeral is undecided at this writing. The funeral will be conducted at the Tromso Lutheran Free church and Rev. A. M. Arntsen will officiate. Mrs. H. O. Hirsching of Kelly Lake is a sister of the deceased.

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WAR HISTORY WORK SHOWS FINE RESULTS

Photo Files Closed. Committee Will Welcome Snaps and Good Reading Matter

Henry G. Young, chairman of the Kandiyoohi County War Records Committee reports that the files were closed on Monday for photographs of the service men whose names and addresses will be honored by places in the Kandiyoohi County War History. A large number of photos have been delivered at the committee's offices but the local committee has to contend with the same difficulties as in other counties in that only a minority per cent of the men have sent in their photos. Many of these doubtless are indifferent as to a picture in the volume and others have been unable to secure one during the time specified by the committee. Nevertheless, hundreds of photos will be reproduced.

The record of every service man from the county will be listed. The book which will contain 200 pages, size 7x10 inches and inclosed is attractive imitation leather cover, with substantial binding, will contain a complete review of the work accomplished in our county during the World War. There will be an abundance of photographs, complete data of work done by local organizations and community drive committees and snapshots and interesting stories told by the service men themselves. The committee desires that all soldiers and anyone engaged in civil work for the cause should send in good pictures and writeups of incidents of interest as soon as possible.
