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WILLMAR CITY TAX LEVY 68.4 MILLS

Increase of Rate Due to Necessary Expenditures for Public Schools

The tax levy within the City of Willmar next year will be 68.4 mills as against 58 mills last year. The increase is due to the added school taxes owing to larger salaries for teachers and other increased expenses for buildings and maintenance of the city schools.

LOST THREE FINGERS WHILE RUNNING MACHINE

Edmond Nasset Has Fingers Lacerated By Joiner This Morning

While operating a joiner at the Sash and Door Factory located west of the city, Edmond Nasset of this city suffered the loss of the first three fingers on his left hand. He was cutting a length of molding wood when the revolving knives struck a loosened knot, throwing the board suddenly to one side bringing the left hand upon the cutter. The fingers were so badly lacerated and crushed that amputation was necessary at the Willmar Hospital where fellow workmen brot Nasset. He is now at the hospital resting until the wounded parts heal sufficiently to allow him to bear it in a sling.
