MILEAGE RATE ON GREAT NORTHERN ADVANCED JAN 1

New Rate of .6 Cent Increase To Take Effect Thruout State Railroads

The passenger rate per mile on the Great Northern Railway lines has been advanced .6 of a cent, this change assuming force on the first day of the new year. The present rate which has existed during the past years had been fixed at 2 cents a mile. The present fare to Minneapolis is \$2.97, while the new rate will amount to \$3.56. To St. Paul, the old rate has been \$3.30 and from Jan. 1, 1921, on will be \$3.97.
