BIG DECREASE IN STOCK RECEIPTS

General Trade on Strong Basis as Result. Hogs up to \$9.75, Lamb Market Uneven

Monday's Opening: South St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 27: Only 1,000 cattle and calves, the lightest Monday run for a long while, sold on a generally strong market with spots higher. Veal calves opened steady with top at \$8.25. Stocker and feeder supply and demand light, market steady to strong. Hogs, 2,400, market 40 to 50c higher, range \$9.50 to \$9.75. Bulk \$9.70 to \$9.75. Best pigs and light lights \$10.00. Sheep 2,200, market strong, best lambs \$10.50, top ewes \$4.00. With only 1,000 cattle and calves, 2,400 hogs and 2,200 sheep here for today's market, receipts for New Year's week will probably fall below the extremely light receipts of Christmas week when about 7,000 cattle, and 4,000 calves, 32,000 hogs and 4,000 sheep were marketed.

Considering the light receipts the cattle market has failed to show the advance which would naturally be expected. However, the market has been on a uniformly strong basis and prices especially for killing classes have gradually worked higher until they show around 25 to 50c advance compared with a week ago.

A few steers are selling up to \$8.50 or better, but practical top this week to date is \$8.25. A few are going from \$7.50 to \$8.00, but bulk are of the common grades selling from \$5.75 to \$7.25. Butcher cows and heifers are going mostly from \$4.00 to \$6.00, with a few of good to choice quality and showing some feed selling from \$6.00 to \$7.00. Canners and cutters are going from \$2.50 to \$4.00, while bologna bulls are moving within the price limits of \$4 to \$5, with a few butcher bulls up to \$6. Best veals dropped to \$7.75 last week but are back up to \$8.25 again today. Stocker and feeder trade is opening steady to strong. Good to choice kinds are selling on a strong basis largely at \$5.50 to \$7, with medium and common grades about steady at prices ranging from \$3 to \$5.50.

Sharply curtailed supplies of hogs and a good shipping demand have brot about an unexpectedly rapid advance of more than \$1 in prices during the past week, but in the opinion of the trade an increase in receipts is probable in the near future, which they feel will probably result in wiping out all of the recent gain. Top stands today at \$9.75, with best light lights and pigs at \$10.00.

The lamb trade continues more or less uneven, with tops at present around \$10.50, and something real choice quotable higher. Best handweight ewes are bringing \$4.00.
