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**BOY MEETS DEATH
WHEN AUTO UPSETS****Lawrence Hanson Family Sustain
Sad Misfortunes In Accident
Sunday Noon**

Reynold Hanson, age 8 yrs, was almost instantly killed and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Hanson and four children slightly bruised as sad results of an automobile accident which occurred last Sunday about 12:30 o'clock near the A. Dokken farm in the vicinity of the Solomon Lake church. The family had left their home about a mile west of the brickyard in their Ford car and were on their way to the O. J. Emberland home in Dove for a Sunday visit. As the car approached the Solomon church and reached a point on the highway where there were banks of four or five feet decline on both sides a puncture of the left rear tire occurred. Mr. Hanson explained that he leaned slightly out of the car to ascertain the trouble and in so doing allowed the wheel to turn the car to the left and off the road. The machine got running at a very moderate rate turned completely over and righted itself again hurling its occupants to the frozen ground.

Mr. and Mrs. Hanson and son Clarence, age 12 years, were seated in the front part of the car and Reynold, Harold, Selma and Julia were together in the rear seat. Reynold appeared to have been thrown to the earth very forcibly suffering fatal fractures of the skull. All members of the family except Reynold were able to arise and take seats in Erick Bergerson's car in which they were driven speedily to Willmar. Reynold died at the Rest Hospital where everything possible was done to rescue the little lad. Dr. Jacobs, the coroner, pronounced the death as being accidental in nature and due to fatal fractures of the skull. Mrs. Hanson received a painful blow in the left shoulder and the two boys, Clarence and Harold, were cut and bruised about the face. Mr. Hanson and the girls escaped without even noticeable injuries.

Reynold Leonard Hanson was born on January 21, 1913, in this city. He was a pupil in the second grade of school. He is survived by his parents and four sisters and brothers to whom the community extends its sincerest sympathy in their great misfortune.

The funeral services were held this afternoon at the Free Lutheran church in this city, Rev. Nicolay Nilsen officiating. Mrs. Hazel Douglas and Ingvald Rykken contributed vocal solos. The pallbearers were four chums of Reynold's, John, Eddie and Helmer Kalleivig, and a son of K. T. Rykken. Interment was made in the Free church cemetery.

**FARM LOAN ASS'N
IN ANNUAL MEET****Amend By-Laws, Elect Officers
and Decide on Picnic. Hope
to Resume Loans Soon**

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Kandiyohi County National Farm Loan Association was held at the courthouse at Willmar at 11 o'clock, Tuesday, Jan. 11.

A fair representation of the stockholders was present. Past work and future prospects were discussed, and a hopeful note was struck, when Secretary-Treasurer William Olson announced that the association would be able to resume making loans during the year.

Sec. 2 of Article 6 of the by-laws was amended to read as follows: "The loan committee shall examine or cause to be examined all land and permanent improvements offered as security for loans, and shall submit to the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul a written report which shall be signed by all members of the committee."

The stockholders voted to join the Minnesota Federation of Farm Loan associations.

The following directors were elected by ballot: Henning Olander, Rt. 3, New London; G. E. Johnson, Penock, Rt. 2; L. E. Wicklund, Atwater, Rt. 6; S. Paulsen, Willmar, Rt. 5; William Henderson, Kandiyohi, Rt. 1; William Honebrink, Atwater; Sam Quam, Penock, Rt. 2.

The stockholders also decided upon holding a picnic at Spicer-on-Green-Lake on June 7, to which all farmers of the county are cordially invited. G. E. Quamme, president of the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul, has promised to be one of the speakers. The directors were instructed to arrange for a good program, including music and it is hoped to make this occasion one of great helpfulness to the farmers of the county.

The newly elected directors met and elected H. Olander, president; G. E. Johnson, vice president; William Olson, secretary and treasurer; loan committee: Andrew Olson of Penock, F. E. Croonquist of Kandiyohi, and C. O. Thompson of Spicer; substitute committee: Henry Honebrink, Atwater, Sam Rodman, Penock, and Nels Johnson, Irving.

The Kandiyohi County association was making good progress when the halt in the farm loan association movement came. This county has seventy-two stockholders, who hold 3,555 shares and have secured loans to the amount of \$355,500. Had this development not been interfered with, members confidently believe the loans taken over in this county would have run over the million mark at this time. The territory in which the Kandiyohi County Federal Loan association operates includes the sixteen northern townships of the county. The southern-most eight townships are organized under the name of the Svea Federal Loan Association.
