32 NEW CITIZENS GIVEN ADMISSION

Only Eight of Forty Applicants are Denied Privileges of Citizenship by Gov. Examiner

George M. Danielson of St. Paul, Chief Naturalization Examiner, passed judgment on the applications for admission into the United States as citizens, of forty residents of Kandiyohi County last Monday, the first day of the District Court session.

HOUSEHOLD GOODS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Gasoline Stove Explodes Causing Fire at Home of Reuben Anderson

An explosion of a gasoline stove caused a costly fire at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Anderson on Fourth St. South last Friday afternoon at 4:30 which involved the loss of practically all the furnishings of the home but a few days previous begun. Mrs. Anderson had just completed her baking when a column of flame burst upwards from the stove. It is said the gasoline flow had been turned off causing some to believe that a leak in the tank or circulation pipes was the origin. The flames soon enveloped the kitchen and spread into the adjoining dining room. Fortunately Mrs. Anderson escaped injury or burns altho she was greatly frightened. All the furniture of the lower story, occupied by the Ekanders was removed, and much damage was done to the house by water.

The fire had burned its way thru the wall, board walls, and ceiling and were emerging thru the roof when the fire truck arrived. The kitchen was totally destroyed and part of the dining room also suffered from the flames. Smoke, heat and water were responsible for the loss of the excellent furniture which the rooms contained. The heat had been so intense that the birds eye maple was badly warped. A new set of furniture and household goods must be purchased stated Mr. Anderson. The fire department by use of both chemicals and water soon mastered the blaze. Much repair work must be done to make the rooms tenable. Mr. Ekander, the owner of the house stated. The Anderson home was located in the second story.

WILL RESUME BUSINESS ON APRIL 1ST

Charles Flann Is President of Reorganized Thorpe Creamery

A special meeting of stockholders in the newly reorganized Thorpe creamery was held last Saturday afternoon at the creamery building and was well attended. The important matters, which came before the meeting were: the election of directors, of board officers and acceptance of the proposed by-laws and articles of incorporation. The last mentioned documents were read and endorsed by the body of stockholders and were declared prepared for filing with the State Security Dept.

The following directors constitute the Board: Charles Flann, Ed Flann, John Leberg, J. Summerlet, Oscar Ruud, Henry Rust. Two of these will serve for one year, two for two years and two for three years. Two directors will be elected every year and serve for a term of three years. These directors have elected their officers as follows: Charles Flann, Pres., J. Summerlet, Sec'y, J. Leberg, Treas., and O. Ruud, V. P.

New shares in the corporation are selling rapidly. The price per share is \$25. Each stockholder has one vote regardless of the amount of stock he owns. The assets of the old concern have been distributed among the old stockholders.

The new officers will have charge of the finances and engage a butter-maker. The capitalization involves \$10,000 distributed over 400 shares of stock. These shares bear 8% interest. The creamery will open its doors for business on April 1st.

The Thorpe creamery association was organized about 25 years ago but in 1915 was outlawed. The firm has been idle since 1918.

At the general citizens' caucus held at the Fire Station Monday night Victor E. Lawson and Gustaf A. Erickson were named as candidates for mayor for the approaching City Election. Mayor Lawson received a two-to-one vote, and received a majority of the votes for all four wards.

C. W. Odell and A. G. Molander were nominated for city treasurer. Hans Gunderson for City Clerk, K. T. Rykken for assessor and George Muller for Judge of Municipal court, had no opposition for their respective offices. The vote is given in detail below.

The caucus was called to order by P. B. Hong, chairman of the caucus committee. Hon. L. O. Thorpe and D. F. Dugan were named for chairman. Mr. Dugan declined in favor of Mr. Thorpe. P. B. Hong was elected secretary.

Mr. Hong moved that nominations be made along the lines of the new primary law amendment and the two persons having the largest vote should go on the ballot. After some discussion the plan was adopted, and the following caucus boards appointed—

First Ward—O. A. Jacobson, Le Roy Johnson and A. Struness.
Second Ward—C. A. Nelson, A. G. Hedin and Hugh Campbell.
Third Ward—S. E. Magnuson, F. O. Berglund and Geo. Jonicks.
Fourth Ward—F. E. Holmberg, Geo. O. Brohaug and Carl J. Freeberg.

Ballot boxes and blank ballots were provided and the balloting continued until all had voted. The returns were then canvassed with the following result:

P. C. Peterson received a majority for both the one and two year terms for second ward alderman. The judges designated him as the candidate for the two year term.

John Feig announced that he was not eligible and could not accept the assessorship even if elected, but received above vote nevertheless. As the hour grew late, before the results were announced, the necessary signatures to the petitions were not secured at the caucus. 370 signatures are required for mayor, treasurer, municipal judge, assessor, clerk and constable. For aldermen 50 signatures are required for first ward, 50 for second, 75 for third and 65 for fourth ward.
