### O. D. DAHLQUIST OF SVEA GOES TO GREAT BEYOND

Svea Resident Passes After Grave Operation for Tumor on April 29th

Ole Danielson Dahlquist, well known resident of Svea in Whitefield Township, passed away Wednesday morning at 2 o'clock, May 4, after a fatal illness of a weeks duration following an operation for tumor of the bladder from which he had been a sufferer for some time. The departed was a respected and active citizen of his community.

The deceased was born in Asum parish, Kristianstads Län, Sweden, on October 12, 1867. His parents were Nils Danielson, born June 10, 1833, and Elna Olson, born Sept. 17, 1833, both of the same province. Dahlquist grew to manhood at the old home in Sweden and obtained a common school education. In 1891 he came to America, landing in New York on March 19th. He first located in Gibbon, Sibley County, Minnesota. Here he worked as blacksmith which was his trade in the homeland of Sweden. On March 9, 1895, he came to Kandiyohi County and located on a farm in Holland Township. Later he gave up this occupation and returned to the anvil and forge opening a shop at Svea.

In the fall of 1902 the deceased made a journey and visit to his native land. On January 30, 1903, at Eka Gärd, Kristianstads Län, Sweden, he was united in marriage to Miss Emma Hanson, who now survives a loving husband. His life-mate was born in Landskrona, Sweden, Aug. 11, 1868.

An adopted son of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Johnson of Svea, Adolph mourns a man who cared for the lad as kindly as a father. Two sisters, Mrs. August Monson and Mrs. P. W. Nelson, both of Minneapolis and a brother in Sweden are the nearest survivors to the departed.

The obsequies were held Sunday, May 8th, at the Svea Lutheran church at 3 p. m. Rev. J. B. Sorenson was the officiating pastor.

Special music was rendered by the choir and Junior choir. The relatives present were: Mrs. Aug. Monson, sister, Mr. Monson and their son, Everice, Mrs. P. W. Nelson, sister, and husband and sons, Everett and Kenneth, all of Minneapolis.

Interment was made in the cemetery.

The last six months Mrs. Nelson had been suffering from tumors. On April 15 she was taken to the Northwestern Hospital in Minneapolis to undergo an operation. It was found that the disease had developed beyond where this could help. On April 29, she passed away.

It was a sad home coming to the bereaved husband and son Gordon who are left to mourn a loving wife and mother. One child, a daughter, died in infancy.

The deceased was a devoted mother, a true Christian, hospitable and kind to all with whom she came in contact. She was an active member of the East Salem church and especially the Ladies Aid. She will be greatly missed by all.

### VISITOR TO CHURCH MEET PROVES STRONG BOOSTER

Supt. Osterholm Was Charmed With Willmar and Progress. Made in Twenty Years

Among the pleasant features of the dedicatory and conference meetings of the Swedish Mission church last week was the visits of former pastors and members who came to enjoy the meetings as well as renew acquaintances. Among these were Revs. Arvid Ostling of Chicago, and Albin N. Osterholm of Omaha. The former is more or less frequently seen here as Mrs. Ostling's parental home is at Willmar, but Rev. Osterholm had not been here since he left the pastorate more than twenty years ago. He is now the superintendent of the Swedish Mission Hospital at Omaha, an institution which has gained well-merited recognition in that large city under the management of Rev. Osterholm.

While he was the Swedish Mission pastor at Willmar Rev. Osterholm took a leading part in civic matters. He was president of the old Civic

Federation, an organization which became the instrument of the progressive people of Willmar when they made the town the first city in Minnesota to reconstruct its affairs along the prohibition policy. Osterholm was a leader who, while remaining fearless and uncompromising in his advocacy of principles, still was broad-minded and sane in their application. The writer enjoyed very much his visits at the Tribune office on the occasion of his visit.

Since arriving at his home at Omaha, Rev. Osterholm writes the Willmar Tribune a letter, from which we take the liberty of reproducing the following:

"My visit to Minnesota was like a pleasant dream. Just why people who are comfortably situated there should wish to go elsewhere, is rather difficult to understand, unless it is due to the prevalent American restlessness so ably described in the American Legion some months ago. It is as follows:

"Let's beat it! Where?  
I do not care. I only know  
I want to go  
From HERE to THERE."

"Kandiyohi county offers practically every advantage mortals may wish. It is far enough north to be cold enough in the winter, and far enough south to be hot enough in the summer; it has plains for those who do not like hills, and hills aplenty for those who do not like the plains; it has fertile soil and charming scenery, dry land and incomparable lakes; and it has institutions worthy of serious consideration. Furthermore, it has a good stable and dependable population. Mineral wealth and chance industries may cease, but the productivity of a good farming country is enhanced with every yield. Continue to preach KANDIYOHI to your constituents. It is as good as the best and better than most places.

"You will notice, that my old time LOCAL PATRIOTISM has not abated one whit. Once a Minnesotan, always a Minnesotan.

"It was a real pleasure to me to come back to Willmar, and the circumstances were propitious. Both the dedicatory services and the conference convention were highly gratifying, but the one thing that stands out in greater prominence was the renewing of friendships old and tried, and the meeting of new friends under somewhat new conditions. What a change in Willmar since June of 1898.
