ANOTHER BREAK IN LIVE STOCK PRICES

Generally Increased Receipts Send Values Downward. Cattle Lose 25 to 50c

(By U. S. Bureau of Markets and Minnesota Dept. of Agriculture)

Monday's Closing: Cattle 1,600. Market closing weak mostly 25 to 40c lower, spots 50c off. Top steers \$8. Calves 600. Market steady on lights. Packer top \$7. Hogs 7,400. Market 10 to 25c lower. Bulk \$7.55 to \$8.25, top \$8.35. Sheep 200. Market mostly 50 to \$1 lower.

South St. Paul, Minn., May 23, 1921: An increase of 10,000 cattle in general receipts at seven leading markets at the week's opening proved too many for an already weak market to absorb except at fresh declines of 25 to 40c and in some cases 50c. Outsiders topped the Monday market, paying \$8 for 12 head of 1325 pound averages, with best steers selling to packers going at \$7.75, and bulk selling from \$6.75 to \$7.50. Most of the butcher cows and heifers sold from \$4.50 to \$6.50, with a few good heifers at \$7. Bulk of the canners and cutters sold from \$2 to \$4.50. Heavy hogs cashed largely from \$4.25 to \$4.75, with a few medium to good beef bulls at \$5 to \$5.50. Best light veals opened steady with packer top at \$7, but heavy calves were 50c or more lower. Desirable kinds of stockers and feeders were scarce but sold weak to 25c lower, while medium and common grades opened a quarter or more lower.

With fairly liberal receipts around the circuit at the week's opening, the hog market dropped 10 to 25c, range \$7 to \$8.35, bulk \$7.55 to \$8.25, bulk good pigs \$9.10. Lambs opened mostly 50c lower, good woolled lambs \$11, good to choice clipppers \$10.50. Sheep about 50 to \$1 lower.

WILLMAR MAIL TO EAST BY U. S. AIR MAIL SERVICE

One Business Day Quicker Delivery and Service Is Benefit

Minneapolis, Minn.

My dear Editor: We have been very anxious that the citizens of Willmar and vicinity should enjoy with us the advantage gained by the inauguration of Air Mail Service from Minneapolis to Chicago. This has finally been accomplished by your office which directs that mail from an postoffice directed to Chicago and other eastern cities reaching Minneapolis in the early morning shall be made up in pouches directed to the Air Mail Service. This mail reaches us in time for the afternoon deliveries in Chicago and for connection with the important fast mail trains for the East. By this means all mail coming into Minneapolis in the morning from your city and vicinity addressed as indicated, is advanced one business day.

There will be later developments that will show even greater improvements and we hope it will not be long until this will be a center from which mail ships will fly thruout the north-west in all directions.

I might add also that some innovations have been added to the Minneapolis office as a result of my recent conference with Postmaster General Hays, which should enable us to take care of all mail from and to your city more promptly than ever.

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
