Under proper and continuous operating six hundred feet of pavement can be laid each day and night. This will mean about one mile each week.

It is of prime importance to first make a uniform high class product, then create a demand for it by advertising. It will be only a short time before all our creameries will be making this high class product, and then the finding of a market is the next step."
