P. O. HALL ATTENDS LAST MAN'S CLUB

Atwater Veteran of Co. B., 1st Minn., Again Meets With Old Comrades at Stillwater

Peter O. Hall of Atwater, veteran of the Civil War and member of the First Minnesota Infantry, has again returned from the annual meetings of the "Last Man's Club" at Stillwater. Regularly every year true to the pledge made in the early eighties, Mr. Hall has made this trip to be in reunion with his old comrades of Co. B. of the First Minnesota.

July 21, 1891, 32 members of the company gathered at the Sawyer House in the St. Croix river town to

renew comradeship, recall war time experiences and partake in a banquet. And each succeeding year on July 21, which is the anniversary of the Battle of Bull Run, in which fight the First Minnesota took part, they have met at the same place in the same way.

At their gathering in 1885 the veterans were presented with a bottle of wine, on which occasion they pledged themselves to meet together every year until but one comrade remained. That comrade was to break the seal of the bottle and drink of the wine to the memory of the thirty odd who had answered the "last call" and gone before.

And thus came to be the now famous "Last Man's Club."

As they meet each year their ranks have thinned and now but five are in life. They are Peter O. Hall, 82, of Atwater, Charles Lockwood, 84, of Chamberlain, S. D., Adam Marty, 83, of St. Paul, John Goff, 77, of the Soldiers Home, Minneapolis, and Emil Graf, 83. Of these the first four mentioned were present at the banquet table last week. The fifth, Mr. Graf, was unable to be present, owing to illness.

Each year the bottle, which is kept for safe keeping at the First National Bank of Stillwater, is brot out and placed on the table. A chair draped in black is placed at the table for each departed comrade.

A good deal of speculation is done as to what the last man will really do with the wine. Now comes a professor of chemistry of the State University and says that the wine has by this time turned into vinegar. The chances are that the bottle, whether ever opened or not, will be ultimately turned over to the Minnesota Historical Society as a relic.
