

STRONG FINISH WINS FOR WILLMAR

Sixteen in the Last Three Frames By the Glenwood and Willmar Nines

The Willmar team made a strong finish last Sunday and walloped the Glenwood nine by a score of 10 to 7. Sixteen runs were scored the last three innings of the game.

The big inning for the home team was in the sixth. Three hits and five errors brought in five runs. Three more runs were scored in the seventh on one hit and two errors. The last two tallies were made off a couple of hits and errors in the eighth.

The first five innings of the game were interesting and only one run was made during this time. Not less than 15 fumbles were made the last three innings.

THIRD INNING Glenwood—Torgerson singled out to center. M. Wollan fanned. Pennington flied out to short. No runs, no hits, no errors.
