ECONOMIC CRISIS SEVERE IN SWEDEN

Martin Leaf, Visitor in Willmar, Describes Present Conditions in Old Countries

In an interview given a Tribune representative, Martin Leaf, a Willmar product and well known here, described conditions as he found them in the Scandinavian countries and in Finland. Mr. Leaf is at present manager of the foreign business field of those nations for the International Harvester Company.

Mr. Leaf was born in our city in 1874 and for twelve years lived here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. B. Leaf. The family then moved to a farm near Pennock. Mr. Leaf stated that since leaving Willmar he has kept in contact with affairs at home thru the columns of the Tribune.

In speaking of conditions in the Scandinavian countries, Mr. Leaf frankly admitted that those nations are feeling the present financial and business depression more severely than the people in this country.

Denmark as a purely agricultural nation is not feeling the grip of the present depression as seriously as Sweden which is a manufacturing and industrial nation.

Politically Sweden, Norway and Denmark are quiet. The government of Sweden is liberal or moderately socialist.


