

NEW LONDON TRIMS WILLMAR AGAIN

The Willmar Team Suffered Another Defeat at Hands of New London Sunday

The locals were defeated by the New London nine by a score of 12 to 8 last Sunday on the local grounds. The Willmar team went entirely to pieces in the first inning and allowed the visitors seven tallies on five hits and three errors. After the first frame R. Johnson allowed three hits for the next five innings.

Robert Anderson, who was behind the bat for the winners, connected for five hits out of five trips to the plate, including a home run, a three bagger, two two-base hits and a single.

Eight hits were made of Manley Ogren but he kept the hits well scattered and two of the Willmar tallies were scored on poor support. Four of these hits were made the last two frames on which four runs were scored. Binga, Severinson and Kieley each made a pair of safe hits.

New London—Sheire was safe on an error by Kieley. Skele singled to center. Swanson was hit by pitched ball, bases full. Nyberg was safe on Kieley's error. Sheire scoring. Thorson singled to left, went second on left fielder's error. Skele and Swanson scoring. Robert Anderson knocked the ball to left field fence for a home run. Nyberg and Thorson being on the paths. Quam out. R. Johnson to Christian. Hood dropped a two bagger into right garden. Ogren smashed the ball to left for a two bagger. Hood scoring. Sheire called out on three strikes. 
